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Guidelines for trained service technicians

This section contains information for trained service technicians.

Inspecting for unsafe conditions

Use the information in this section to help you identify potential unsafe conditions in an IBM® product that you are working on. Each IBM product, as it was designed and manufactured, has required safety items to protect users and service technicians from injury. The information in this section addresses only those items. Use good judgment to identify potential unsafe conditions that might be caused by non-IBM alterations or attachment of non-IBM features or options that are not addressed in this section. If you identify an unsafe condition, you must determine how serious the hazard is and whether you must correct the problem before you work on the product.

Consider the following conditions and the safety hazards that they present:

- Electrical hazards, especially primary power. Primary voltage on the frame can cause serious or fatal electrical shock.
- Explosive hazards, such as a damaged CRT face or a bulging or leaking capacitor.
- · Mechanical hazards, such as loose or missing hardware.

To inspect the product for potential unsafe conditions, complete the following steps:

- 1. Make sure that the power is off and the power cord is disconnected.
- 2. Make sure that the exterior cover is not damaged, loose, or broken, and observe any sharp edges.
- 3. Check the power cord:
 - Make sure that the third-wire ground connector is in good condition. Use a
 meter to measure third-wire ground continuity for 0.1 ohm or less between
 the external ground pin and the frame ground.
 - Make sure that the power cord is the correct type, as specified in "Power cords" on page 138.
 - · Make sure that the insulation is not frayed or worn.
- 4. Remove the cover.
- 5. Check for any obvious non-IBM alterations. Use good judgment as to the safety of any non-IBM alterations.
- 6. Check inside the server for any obvious unsafe conditions, such as metal filings, contamination, water or other liquid, or signs of fire or smoke damage.
- 7. Check for worn, frayed, or pinched cables.
- 8. Make sure that the power-supply cover fasteners (screws or rivets) have not been removed or tampered with.

Guidelines for servicing electrical equipment

Observe the following guidelines when you service electrical equipment:

- Check the area for electrical hazards such as moist floors, nongrounded power extension cords, and missing safety grounds.
- Use only approved tools and test equipment. Some hand tools have handles that are covered with a soft material that does not provide insulation from live electrical currents.
- Regularly inspect and maintain your electrical hand tools for safe operational condition. Do not use worn or broken tools or testers.
- Do not touch the reflective surface of a dental mirror to a live electrical circuit.
 The surface is conductive and can cause personal injury or equipment damage if it touches a live electrical circuit.
- Some rubber floor mats contain small conductive fibers to decrease electrostatic discharge. Do not use this type of mat to protect yourself from electrical shock.
- Do not work alone under hazardous conditions or near equipment that has hazardous voltages.
- Locate the emergency power-off (EPO) switch, disconnecting switch, or electrical outlet so that you can turn off the power quickly in the event of an electrical accident.
- Disconnect all power before you perform a mechanical inspection, work near power supplies, or remove or install main units.
- Before you work on the equipment, disconnect the power cord. If you cannot
 disconnect the power cord, have the customer power-off the wall box that
 supplies power to the equipment and lock the wall box in the off position.
- Never assume that power has been disconnected from a circuit. Check it to make sure that it has been disconnected.
- If you have to work on equipment that has exposed electrical circuits, observe the following precautions:
 - Make sure that another person who is familiar with the power-off controls is near you and is available to turn off the power if necessary.
 - When you are working with powered-on electrical equipment, use only one hand. Keep the other hand in your pocket or behind your back to avoid creating a complete circuit that could cause an electrical shock.
 - When you use a tester, set the controls correctly and use the approved probe leads and accessories for that tester.
 - Stand on a suitable rubber mat to insulate you from grounds such as metal floor strips and equipment frames.
- · Use extreme care when you measure high voltages.
- To ensure proper grounding of components such as power supplies, pumps, blowers, fans, and motor generators, do not service these components outside of their normal operating locations.
- If an electrical accident occurs, use caution, turn off the power, and send another person to get medical aid.

Statement 1:

To Connect:

To Disconnect:

- 1. Turn everything OFF.
- 2. First, remove power cords from outlet.
- 3. Remove signal cables from connectors.
- 4. Remove all cables from devices.

Statement 2:



CAUTION:

When replacing the lithium battery, use only IBM Part Number 33F8354 or an equivalent type battery recommended by the manufacturer. If your system has a module containing a lithium battery, replace it only with the same module type made by the same manufacturer. The battery contains lithium and can explode if not properly used, handled, or disposed of.

Do not:

- · Throw or immerse into water
- Heat to more than 100°C (212°F)
- · Repair or disassemble

Dispose of the battery as required by local ordinances or regulations.



Chapter 1. Start here

You can solve many problems without outside assistance by following the troubleshooting procedures in this *Problem Determination and Service Guide* and on the IBM Web site. This document describes the diagnostic tests that you can perform, troubleshooting procedures, and explanations of error messages and error codes. The documentation that comes with your operating system and software also contains troubleshooting information.

Diagnosing a problem

Before you contact IBM or an approved warranty service provider, follow these procedures in the order in which they are presented to diagnose a problem with your server:

1. Determine what has changed.

Determine whether any of the following items were added, removed, replaced, or updated before the problem occurred:

- IBM System x Server Firmware (server firmware)
- Device drivers
- Firmware
- · Hardware components
- Software

If possible, return the server to the condition it was in before the problem occurred.

2. Collect data.

Thorough data collection is necessary for diagnosing hardware and software problems.

a. Document error codes and system-board LEDs.

- **System error codes:** See "POST error codes" on page 26 for information about a specific error code.
- See "System-board LEDs" on page 19 for the location of the system-board LEDs.
- Software or operating-system error codes: See the documentation for the software or operating system for information about a specific error code. See the manufacturer's Web site for documentation.

b. Collect system data.

Run the Dynamic System Analysis (DSA) diagnostics program to collect information about the hardware, firmware, software, and operating system. Have this information available when you contact IBM or an approved warranty service provider. See "Running the diagnostic programs" on page 74 for the instructions to run the DSA program.

- 3) Click Tools reference > Error reporting and analysis tools > IBM **Dynamic System Analysis.**
- 3. Follow the problem-resolution procedures.

The four problem-resolution procedures are presented in the order in which they are most likely to solve your problem. Follow these procedures in the order in which they are presented:

a. Check for and apply code updates.

Most problems that appear to be caused by faulty hardware are actually caused by the server firmware (formerly BIOS firmware), device firmware, or device drivers that are not at the latest levels.

- 1) Determine the existing code levels. In DSA, click Firmware/VPD to view system firmware levels, or click **Software** to view operating-system levels.
- 2) Download and install updates of code that is not at the latest level.

Important: Some cluster solutions require specific code levels or coordinated code updates. If the device is part of a cluster solution, verify that the latest level of code is supported for the cluster solution before you update the code.

To display a list of available updates for your server, go to http://www.ibm.com/systems/support/supportsite.wss/ docdisplay?brandind=5000008&Indocid=MIGR-4JTS2T or complete the following steps.

- Under Popular links, click Software and device drivers.
- d) Click System x3200 M3 to display the list of downloadable files for the server.

You can install code updates that are packaged as an Update Xpress System Pack or Update Xpress CD image. An Update Xpress System Pack contains an integration-tested bundle of online firmware and device-driver updates for your server. Use Update Xpress System Pack Installer to acquire and apply Update Xpress System Packs and individual firmware and device-driver updates. For additional information and to download the Update Xpress System Pack Installer, go to the System x and BladeCenter Tools Center at http://publib.boulder.ibm.com/ infocenter/toolsctr/v1r0/index.jsp and click **UpdateXpress System Pack** Installer.

Be sure to separately install any listed critical updates that have release dates that are later than the release date of the Update Xpress System Pack or Update Xpress image.

When you click an update, an information page is displayed, including a list of the problems that the update fixes. Review this list for your specific problem; however, even if your problem is not listed, installing the update might solve the problem.

b. Check for and correct an incorrect configuration.

If the server is incorrectly configured, a system function can fail to work when you enable it; if you make an incorrect change to the server configuration, a system function that has been enabled can stop working.

1) Make sure that all installed hardware and software are supported.

See http://www.ibm.com/servers/eserver/serverproven/compat/us/ to verify that the server supports the installed operating system, optional devices, and software levels. If any hardware or software component is not supported, uninstall it to determine whether it is causing the problem. You must remove nonsupported hardware before you contact IBM or an approved warranty service provider for support.

2) Make sure that the server, operating system, and software are installed and configured correctly.

Many configuration problems are caused by loose power or signal cables or incorrectly seated adapters. You might be able to solve the problem by turning off the server, reconnecting cables, reseating adapters, and turning the server back on. See "Checkout procedure" on page 55 for the instructions to perform the checkout procedures.

If the problem is associated with a specific function (for example, if a RAID hard disk drive is marked offline in the RAID array), see the documentation for the associated controller and management or controlling software to verify that the controller is correctly configured.

Problem determination information is available for many devices such as RAID and network adapters.

For problems with operating systems or IBM software or devices, complete the following steps.

c. Check for service bulletins.

d. Check for and replace defective hardware.

If a hardware component is not operating within specifications, it can cause unpredictable results. Most hardware failures are reported as error codes in a system or operating-system log. See "Troubleshooting tables" on page 57 and Chapter 5, "Removing and replacing server components," on page 141 for more information.

Troubleshooting procedures are also provided on the IBM Web site. A single problem might cause multiple symptoms. Follow the diagnostic procedure for the most obvious symptom. If that procedure does not diagnose the problem, use the procedure for another symptom, if possible. To locate troubleshooting procedures for your server, complete the following steps.

Undocumented problems

If you have completed the diagnostic procedure and the problem remains, the problem might not have been previously identified by IBM. After you have verified that all code is at the latest level, all hardware and software configurations are valid, and no light path diagnostics LEDs or log entries indicate a hardware component failure, contact IBM or an approved warranty service provider for assistance. Be prepared to provide information about any error codes and collected data and the problem determination procedures that you have used.

Chapter 2. Introduction

This *Problem Determination and Service Guide* contains information to help you solve problems that might occur in the IBM System x3200 M3 Types 7327 or 7328 server. It describes the diagnostic tools that come with the server, error codes and suggested actions, and instructions for replacing failing components.

Replaceable components are of four types:

- Consumable part: Purchase and replacement of consumable parts
 (components, such as batteries and printer cartridges, that have depletable life)
 is your responsibility. If IBM acquires or installs a consumable part at your
 request, you will be charged for the service.
- Tier 1 customer replaceable unit (CRU): Replacement of Tier 1 CRUs is your responsibility. If IBM installs a Tier 1 CRU at your request, you will be charged for the installation.
- Tier 2 customer replaceable unit: You may install a Tier 2 CRU yourself or request IBM to install it, at no additional charge, under the type of warranty service that is designated for the server.
- Field replaceable unit (FRU): FRUs must be installed only by trained service technicians.





Front view


The following illustration shows the 3.5-inch SAS/SATA hot-swap hard disk drive model:

Power control button and power-on LED

Press this button to turn the server on and off manually or to wake the server from a reduced-power state. The states of the power-on LED are as follows:

Off: AC power is not present, or the power supply or the LED itself has failed.

Flashing rapidly (4 times per second): The server is turned off and is not ready to be turned on. The power-control button is disabled. This will last approximately 1 to 3 minutes.

Flashing slowly (once per second): The server is turned off and is ready to be turned on. You can press the power-control button to turn on the server.

Lit: The server is turned on.

Fading on and off: The server is in a reduced-power state. To wake the server, press the power-control button or use the IMM Web interface. See "Logging on to the Web interface" on page 232 for information on logging on to the IMM Web interface.

Hard disk drive activity LED

When this LED is flashing, it indicates that the associated hard disk drive is in use.

System-error LED

When this amber LED is lit, it indicates that a system error has occurred. An LED on the system board might also be lit to help isolate the error. SeeChapter 3, "Diagnostics," on page 23 for additional information.

USB connectors

Connect USB devices to these connectors.

DVD-eject button

Press this button to release a CD or DVD from the DVD drive.

DVD drive activity LED

When this LED is lit, it indicates that the DVD drive is in use.

Hot-swap hard disk drive activity LED (some models)

On some server models, each hot-swap drive has a hard disk drive activity LED. When this green LED is flashing, it indicates that the drive is in use.

When the drive is removed, this LED also is visible on the SAS/SATA backplane, next to the drive connector. The backplane is the printed circuit board behind drive bays 4 through 7 (or bays 4 through 11 on some 2.5-inch hard disk drive SAS models).

Hot-swap hard disk drive status LED (some models)


On some server models, each hot-swap hard disk drive has an amber status LED. If this amber status LED for a drive is lit, it indicates that the associated hard disk drive has failed.

If an optional ServeRAID adapter is installed in the server and the LED flashes slowly (one flash per second), the drive is being rebuilt. If the LED flashes rapidly (three flashes per second), the adapter is identifying the drive.


When the drive is removed, this LED also is visible on the SAS/SATA backplane, below the hot-swap hard disk drive activity LED.

Power-cord connector

Connect the power cord to this connector.

AC power LED

This green LED provides status information about the power supply. During typical operation, both the ac and dc power LEDs are lit. For any other combination of LEDs, see the "Power-supply LEDs" on page 71.

DC power LED

This green LED provides status information about the power supply. During typical operation, both the ac and dc power LEDs are lit. For any other combination of LEDs, see the "Power-supply LEDs" on page 71.

Power-error (!) LED

When this amber LED is lit, it indicates that the power supply has failed.

Serial connector

Connect a 9-pin serial device to this connector.

Video connector

Connect a monitor to this connector.

USB connectors

Connect USB devices to these connectors.

Ethernet connector

Use either of these connectors to connect the server to a network. When you use the Ethernet 1 connector, the network can be shared with the IMM through a single network cable.

Ethernet transmit/receive activity LED

This LED is on the Ethernet connector. When this LED is lit, it indicates that there is activity between the server and the network.

Ethernet link status LED

This LED is on the Ethernet connector. When this LED is lit, it indicates that there is an active connection on the Ethernet port.

Server power features

When the server is connected to an ac power source but is not turned on, the operating system does not run, and all core logic except for the service processor (the Integrated Management Module) is shut down; however, the server can respond to requests to the service processor, such as a remote request to turn on the server. The power-on LED flashes to indicate that the server is connected to ac power but is not turned on.

Turning on the server

Approximately 5 seconds after the server is connected to ac power, one or more fans might start running to provide cooling while the server is connected to power and the power-on button LED will blink quickly. Approximately 1 to 3 minutes after the server is connected to ac power, the power-control button becomes active (the power-on LED will blink slowly). You can turn on the server by pressing the power-control button.

The server can also be turned on in any of the following ways:

- If a power failure occurs while the server is turned on, the server will restart automatically when power is restored.
- If your operating system supports the Wake on LAN feature, the Wake on LAN feature can turn on the server.

Note: When 4 GB or more of memory (physical or logical) is installed, some memory is reserved for various system resources and is unavailable to the

operating system. The amount of memory that is reserved for system resources depends on the operating system, the configuration of the server, and the configured peripheral component interconnect (PCI) options.

Turning off the server

When you turn off the server and leave it connected to ac power, the server can respond to requests to the service processor, such as a remote request to turn on the server. While the server remains connected to ac power, one or more fans might continue to run. To remove all power from the server, you must disconnect it from the power source.

Some operating systems require an orderly shutdown before you turn off the server. See your operating-system documentation for information about shutting down the operating system.



CAUTION:

The power control button on the device and the power switch on the power supply do not turn off the electrical current supplied to the device. The device also might have more than one power cord. To remove all electrical current from the device, ensure that all power cords are disconnected from the power source.



The server can be turned off in any of the following ways:


- You can turn off the server from the operating system, if your operating system supports this feature. After an orderly shutdown of the operating system, the server will be turned off automatically.
- You can press the power-control button to start an orderly shutdown of the operating system and turn off the server, if your operating system supports this feature.
- If the operating system stops functioning, you can press and hold the power-control button for more than 4 seconds to turn off the server.
- · The server can be turned off by Wake on LAN feature.
- The integrated management module (IMM) can turn off the server as an automatic response to a critical system failure.

The illustrations in this section show the connectors, light-emitting diodes (LEDs), and switches on the system board. The illustrations might differ slightly from your hardware.


System-board internal connectors

System-board external connectors


The following illustration shows the external input/output (I/O) connectors on the system board.



The following illustration shows the system-board connectors for user-installable optional devices.





Chapter 3. Diagnostics

This chapter describes the diagnostic tools that are available to help you solve problems that might occur in the server.

If you cannot locate and correct the problem using the information in this chapter, see Appendix A, "Getting help and technical assistance," on page 245 for more information.

Diagnostic tools

The following tools are available to help you diagnose and solve hardware-related problems:

POST error messages and error logs

The power-on self-test (POST) generates messages to indicate successful test completion or the detection of a problem. See "POST" on page 26, "Event logs" on page 24, and "POST error codes" on page 26 for more information.

· Troubleshooting tables

These tables list problem symptoms and actions to correct the problems. See "Troubleshooting tables" on page 57 for more information.

Dynamic System Analysis (DSA) Preboot diagnostic programs

The DSA Preboot diagnostic programs provide problem isolation, configuration analysis, and error log collection. The diagnostic programs are the primary method of testing the major components of the server and are stored in integrated USB memory. The diagnostic programs collect the following information about the server:

- System configuration
- Network interfaces and settings
- Installed hardware
- Service processor status and configuration
- Vital product data, firmware, and UEFI configuration
- Hard disk drive health
- RAID controller configuration
- Controller event logs, including the following information:
 - System error logs
 - Temperature, voltage, and fan speed information
 - Self-monitoring Analysis, and Reporting Technology (SMART) data
 - Machine check registers
 - USB information
 - Monitor configuration information
 - PCI slot information

The diagnostic programs create a merged log that includes events from all collected logs. The information is collected into a file that you can send to IBM service and support. Additionally, you can view the server information locally through a generated text report file. You can also copy the log to removable media and view the log from a Web browser. See "Running the diagnostic programs" on page 74 and "Diagnostic messages" on page 75 for more information.

Server LEDs

Use the LEDs on the server to diagnose system errors quickly. See "Error LEDs" on page 69 for more information.

IBM Electronic Service Agent

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IBM Electronic Service Agent is a software tool that monitors the server for hardware error events and automatically submits electronic service requests to IBM service and support. In addition, it can collect and transmit system configuration information on a scheduled basis so that the information is available to you and your support representative. It uses minimal system resources, and is available free of charge. For more information and to download IBM Electronic Service Agent, go to http://www.ibm.com/support/electronic/

Event logs

Error codes and messages are displayed in the following types of event logs:

- POST event log: This log contains the three most recent error codes and messages that were generated during POST. You can view the POST event log through the Setup utility.
- **System-event log:** This log contains messages that were generated during POST and all system status messages from the service processor. You can view the contents of the system-event log from the Setup utility for more information. The system-event log is limited in size. When it is full, new entries will not overwrite existing entries; therefore, you must periodically clear the system-event log through the Setup utility. When you are troubleshooting, you might have to clear the system-event log to make the most recent events available for analysis. Each system-event log entry is displayed on its own page. Message are listed on the left side of the screen, and details about the selected message is displayed on the right side of the screen. To move from one entry to the next, use the Up Arrow (↑) and Down Arrow (↓) keys.

The system-event log indicates an assertion event when an event has occurred. It indicates a de-assertion event when the event is no longer occurring.

- Integrated management module (IMM) event log: This log contains a filtered subset of all IMM, POST, and system management interrupt (SMI) events. You can view the IMM event log through the IMM Web interface and through the Dynamic System Analysis (DSA) program (as the ASM event log).
- DSA log: This log is generated by the Dynamic System Analysis (DSA) program, and it is a chronologically ordered merge of the system-event log (as the IPMI event log), the IMM chassis-event log (as the ASM event log), and the operating-system event logs. You can view the DSA log through the DSA program.

Viewing event logs through the Setup utility

To view the POST event log or system-event log, complete the following steps:

- 1. Turn on the server.
- 2. When the prompt <F1> Setup is displayed, press F1. If you have set both a power-on password and an administrator password, you must type the administrator password to view the event logs.
- 3. Select **System Event Logs** and use one of the following procedures:
 - To view the POST event log, select POST Event Viewer.
 - To view the IMM system-event log, select System Event Log.

Viewing event logs without restarting the server

When the server is not hung and the IMM is connected to a network, methods are available for you to view one or more event logs without having to restart the server.

If you have installed Portable or Installable Dynamic System Analysis (DSA), you can use it to view the system-event log (as the IPMI event log), the IMM event log (as the ASM event log), the operating-system event logs, or the merged DSA log. You can also use DSA Preboot to view these logs, although you must restart the server to use DSA Preboot. To install Portable DSA, Installable DSA, or DSA Preboot or to download a DSA Preboot CD image, go to http://www.ibm.com/systems/support/supportsite.wss/docdisplay?Indocid=SERV-DSA &brandind=5000008 or complete the following steps.

Note: Changes are made periodically to the IBM Web site. The actual procedure might vary slightly from what is described in this document.

Clearing the event logs

To clear the event logs, complete the following steps.

Note: The POST event log is automatically cleared each time the server is restarted.

- 2. When the prompt <F1> Setup is displayed, press F1. If you have set both a power-on password and an administrator password, you must type the administrator password to view the error logs.
- Use one of the following procedures:
 - To clear the IMM system-event log, select System Event Logs --> System
 Event Log. Select Clear System Event Log; then, press Enter twice.

POST

When you turn on the server, it performs a series of tests to check the operation of the server components and some optional devices in the server. This series of tests is called the power-on self-test, or POST.

Note: This server does not use beep codes for server status.

If the system-board tray is configured to require entry of a password to complete the system startup, you need to type both the administrator password and power-on password to complete the system startup, if either password is set.

If POST detects a problem, an error message is displayed. See "POST error codes" for more information.

POST error codes

The following table describes the POST error codes and suggested actions to correct the detected problems. These errors can appear as severe, warning, or informational.

The system-event log contains messages of three types:

Information

Information messages do not require action; they record significant system-level events, such as when the server is started.

Warning

Warning messages do not require immediate action; they indicate possible problems, such as when the recommended maximum ambient temperature is exceeded.

Error Error messages might require action; they indicate system errors, such as when a fan is not detected.

Each message contains date and time information, and it indicates the source of the message (POST or the IMM).

Checkout procedure

This section contains a checkout procedure that you should follow to solve hardware problems in the server.

About the checkout procedure

Before you perform the checkout procedure for diagnosing hardware problems, review the following information:

- · Read the safety information that begins on page vii.
- The diagnostic programs provide the primary methods of testing the major components of the server, such as the I/O board, Ethernet controller, keyboard, mouse (pointing device), serial ports, and hard disk drives. You can also use them to test some external devices. If you are not sure whether a problem is caused by the hardware or by the software, you can use the diagnostic programs to confirm that the hardware is working correctly.
- When you run the diagnostic programs, a single problem might cause more than
 one error message. When this happens, correct the cause of the first error
 message. The other error messages usually will not occur the next time you run
 the diagnostic programs.

Exception: If multiple error codes or light path diagnostics LEDs indicate a microprocessor error, the error might be in a microprocessor or in a microprocessor socket. See "Microprocessor problems" on page 62 for information about diagnosing microprocessor problems.

- Before you run the diagnostic programs, you must determine whether the failing server is part of a shared hard disk drive cluster (two or more servers that share external storage devices). If it is part of a cluster, you can run all diagnostic programs except the ones that test the storage unit (that is, a hard disk drive in the storage unit) or the storage adapter that is attached to the storage unit. The failing server might be part of a cluster if any of the following conditions is true:
 - You have identified the failing server as part of a cluster (two or more servers that share external storage devices).
 - One or more external storage units are attached to the failing server and at least one of the attached storage units is also attached to another server or unidentifiable device.
 - One or more servers are located near the failing server.

Important: If the server is part of a shared hard disk drive cluster, run one test at a time. Do not run any suite of tests, such as "quick" or "normal" tests, because this might enable the hard disk drive diagnostic tests.

- If the server is halted and a POST error code is displayed, see "Event logs" on page 24. If the server is halted and no error message is displayed, see "System-board jumpers and switches" on page 20 and "Solving undetermined problems" on page 130.
- For information about power-supply problems, see "Solving power problems" on page 128 and "Power-supply LEDs" on page 71.
- For intermittent problems, check the error log; see "Event logs" on page 24 and "Diagnostic messages" on page 75.

- 3. Did a single beep sound and are there readable instructions on the main menu, or was a POST error code displayed?
 - Yes: Find the "POST error codes" on page 26; if necessary, see "Solving undetermined problems" on page 130.
 - No: Find the failure symptom in "Troubleshooting tables" on page 57; if necessary, run the diagnostic programs (see "Running the diagnostic programs" on page 74).
 - If you receive an error, see "Diagnostic messages" on page 75.
 - If the diagnostic programs were completed successfully and you still suspect a problem, see "Solving undetermined problems" on page 130.

Error LEDs

The following is an illustration of the system board LEDs. The system board has error LEDs that will help to locate the source of the error. Run the diagnostic programs to find out the cause of the error (see "Running the diagnostic programs" on page 74).

The server is designed so that LEDs remain lit when the server is connected to an ac power source but is not turned on, provided that the power supply is operating correctly. This feature helps you to isolate the problem when the operating system is shut down.

Many errors are first indicated by a lit system-error LED on the control-panel assembly of the server. If this LED is lit, one or more LEDs elsewhere in the server might also be lit and can direct you to the source of the error.

Before working inside the server to view the LEDs, read the safety information that begins on page vii and "Handling static-sensitive devices" on page 144.

If an error occurs, view the server LEDs in the following order:

- 1. Check the control-panel assembly on the front of the server. If the system-error LED is lit, it indicates that an error has occurred.
- Check the front and rear of the server to determine whether any component LEDs are lit.
- Remove the server cover and look inside the server for lit LEDs. Certain components inside the server have LEDs that will be lit to indicate the location of a problem. For example, a DIMM error will light the LED next to the failing DIMM on the system board.

Look at the system service label inside the side cover of the server, which gives an overview of internal components. This information can often provide enough information to correct the error.

The following table describes the LEDs on the system board and PCI extender cards and suggested actions to correct the detected problems.



Diagnostic programs and messages

The diagnostic programs are the primary method of testing the major components of the server. As you run the diagnostic programs, text messages are displayed on the screen and are saved in the test log. A diagnostic text message indicates that a problem has been detected and provides the action you should take as a result of the text message.

Make sure that the server has the latest version of the diagnostic programs. To download the latest version, complete the following steps.

Note: Changes are made periodically to the IBM Web site. The actual procedure might vary slightly from what is described in this document.

- 2. Under Product support, click System x.
- 3. Under Popular links, click Software and device drivers.
- Click IBM System x3200 M3 to display the matrix of downloadable files for the server.

Utilities are available to reset and update the diagnostics code on the integrated USB flash device, if the diagnostic partition becomes damaged and does not start the diagnostic programs. The DSA diagnostic programs collect information about the following aspects of the system:

- System configuration
- · Network interfaces and settings
- Hardware inventory, including PCI and USB information
- · Drive health information
- SAS/SATA RAID and controller configuration
- Event logs for ServeRAID controllers and service processors

The DSA diagnostic programs can also provide diagnostics for the following system components, if they are installed in the system:

- Intel Dual Gigabit Ethernet
- · Optical drives
- · Hard disk drives
- SAS/SATA RAID controller
- Integrated management module (IMM)
- · Trusted Platform Module chip
- Memory
- Microprocessor

Running the diagnostic programs

To run the DSA Preboot diagnostic programs, complete the following steps:

- 1. If the server is running, turn off the server and all attached devices.
- 2. Turn on all attached devices; then, turn on the server.
- 3. When the prompt <F2> Diagnostics is displayed, press F2.

Note: The DSA Preboot diagnostic program might appear to be unresponsive for an unusual length of time when you start the program. This is normal operation while the program loads.

4. Optionally, select **Quit to DSA** to exit from the stand-alone memory diagnostic program.

Note: After you exit from the stand-alone memory diagnostic environment, you must restart the server to access the stand-alone memory diagnostic environment again.

- 5. Select gui to display the graphical user interface, or select cmd to display the DSA interactive menu.
- 6. Follow the instructions on the screen to select the diagnostic test to run.

If the diagnostic programs do not detect any hardware errors but the problem remains during normal server operations, a software error might be the cause. If you suspect a software problem, see the information that comes with your software.

A single problem might cause more than one error message. When this happens, correct the cause of the first error message. The other error messages usually will not occur the next time you run the diagnostic programs.

Exception: If multiple error codes or LEDs indicate a microprocessor error, the error might be in a microprocessor or in a microprocessor socket. See "Microprocessor problems" on page 62 for information about diagnosing microprocessor problems.

If the server stops during testing and you cannot continue, restart the server and try to run the diagnostic programs again. If the problem remains, replace the component that was being tested when the server stopped.

Diagnostic text messages

Diagnostic text messages are displayed while the tests are running. A diagnostic text message contains one of the following results:

Passed: The test was completed without any errors.

Failed: The test detected an error.

Aborted: The test could not proceed because of the server configuration.

Viewing the test log

To view the test log when the tests are completed, type the **view** command in the DSA interactive menu, or select **Diagnostic Event Log** in the graphical user interface. To transfer DSA Preboot collections to an external USB device, type the copy command in the DSA interactive menu.

Recovering the server firmware

Important: Some cluster solutions require specific code levels or coordinated code updates. If the device is part of a cluster solution, verify that the latest level of code is supported for the cluster solution before you update the code.

If the server firmware has become corrupted, such as from a power failure during an update, you can recover the server firmware in one of two ways:

- In-band method: Recover server firmware, using either the boot block jumper (Automated Boot Recovery) and a server Firmware Update Package Service Pack.
- Out-of-band method: Use the IMM Web Interface to update the firmware, using the latest server firmware update package.

Note: You can obtain a server update package from one of the following sources:

- Download the server firmware update from the World Wide Web.
- · Contact your IBM service representative.

To download the server firmware update package from the World Wide Web, complete the following steps.

Note: Changes are made periodically to the IBM Web site. The actual procedure might vary slightly from what is described in this document.


- 1. Go to http://www.ibm.com/systems/support/.
- Under Product support, click System x.
- 3. Under Popular links, click Software and device drivers.
- Click System x3200 M3 to display the matrix of downloadable files for the server.
- 5. Download the latest server firmware update.

The flash memory of the server consists of a primary bank and a backup bank. It is essential that you maintain the backup bank with a bootable firmware image. If the primary bank becomes corrupted, you can either manually boot the backup bank with the boot block jumper, or in the case of image corruption, this will occur automatically with the Automated Boot Recovery function.

In-band manual recovery method

To recover the server firmware and restore the server operation to the primary bank, complete the following steps:

- 1. Read the safety information that begins on page vii and "Handling static-sensitive devices" on page 144.
- 2. Turn off the server, and disconnect all power cords and external cables.
- 3. Unlock and remove the server cover. See "Removing the side cover" on page 145 for more information.
- 4. Locate the boot block jumper (JP6) on the system board.



- 5. Move the jumper from pins 1 and 2 to pins 2 and 3 to enable the UEFI recovery mode.
- 6. Reinstall the server cover (see "Installing the side cover" on page 146); then, reconnect all power cords.

- 7. Restart the server. The power-on self-test (POST) starts.
- 8. Boot the server to an operating system that is supported by the firmware update package that you downloaded.
- 9. Perform the firmware update by following the instructions that are in the firmware update package readme file.
- 10. Copy the downloaded firmware update package into a directory.
- 11. From a command line, type filename-s, where filename is the name of the executable file that you downloaded with the firmware update package.
- 12. Turn off the server and disconnect all power cords and external cables, and then remove the server cover.
- 13. Move the UEFI boot recovery jumper back to the primary position (pins 1 and
- 14. Reinstall the server cover, and then reconnect all the power cables.
- 15. Restart the server.

See "System-board jumpers and switches" on page 20 for a description of the jumpers and switches.

In-band automated boot recovery method

Note: Use this method if the System board error LED is lit and there is a log entry or Booting Backup Image is displayed on the firmware splash screen; otherwise, use the in-band manual recovery method.

- 1. Boot the server to an operating system that is supported by the firmware update package that you downloaded.
- 2. Perform the firmware update by following the instructions that are in the firmware update package readme file.
- 3. Restart the server.
- 4. At the firmware splash screen, press F3 when prompted to restore to the primary bank. The server boots from the primary bank.

Out-of-band method: See the IMM documentation.

Automated boot recovery (ABR)

If the server is booting up and the IMM detect problems with the server firmware in the primary bank, it will automatically switch to the backup firmware bank and give you the opportunity to recover the primary bank. To recover to the server firmware primary bank, complete the following steps.

- 1. Restart the server.
- 2. When the prompt press F3 to restore to primary is displayed, press F3 to recover the primary bank. Pressing F3 will restart the server.

Three boot failure

Configuration changes, such as added devices or adapter firmware updates can cause the server to fail POST (power-on self-test). If this occurs on three consecutive boot attempts, the server will temporarily use the default configuration values and automatically goes to F1 Setup. To solve the problem, complete the following steps:

- 1. Undo any configuration changes that you made recently and restart the server.
- 2. Remove any devices that you added recently and restart the server.

3. If the problem remains, go to Setup and select **Load Default Settings**, and then click **Save** to restore the server factory settings.

Solving SCSI problems

Note: This information also applies to Serial Attached SCSI (SAS) problems.

For any SCSI error message, one or more of the following devices might be causing the problem:

- A failing SCSI device (adapter, drive, or controller)
- · An incorrect SCSI termination jumper setting
- · A missing or incorrectly installed SCSI terminator
- · A defective SCSI terminator
- · An incorrectly installed cable
- · A defective cable

For any SCSI error message, follow these suggested actions in the order in which they are listed until the problem is solved:

- Make sure that external SCSI devices are turned on before you turn on the server.
- 2. Make sure that the cables for all external SCSI devices are connected correctly.
- 3. If an external SCSI device is attached, make sure that the external SCSI termination is set to automatic.
- 4. Make sure that the last device in each SCSI chain is terminated correctly.
- 5. Make sure that the SCSI devices are configured correctly.

Solving power problems

Power problems can be difficult to solve. For example, a short circuit can exist anywhere on any of the power distribution buses. Usually, a short circuit will cause the power subsystem to shut down because of an overcurrent condition. To diagnose a power problem, use the following general procedure:

- 1. Turn off the server and disconnect all ac power cords.
- 2. Check for loose cables in the power subsystem. Also check for short circuits, for example, if a loose screw is causing a short circuit on a circuit board.
- 3. Remove the adapters and disconnect the cables and power cords to all internal and external devices until the server is at the minimum configuration that is required for the server to start (see "Solving undetermined problems" on page 130 for the minimum configuration).
- Reconnect all ac power cords and turn on the server. If the server starts successfully, replace the adapters and devices one at a time until the problem is isolated.

If the server does not start from the minimum configuration, replace the components in the minimum configuration one at a time until the problem is isolated.

Solving Ethernet controller problems

The method that you use to test the Ethernet controller depends on which operating system you are using. See the operating-system documentation for information about Ethernet controllers, and see the Ethernet controller device-driver readme file.

Note: The Ethernet controller can be installed only in its dedicated connector, PCI slot 3.

Try the following procedures:

- · Make sure that the correct device drivers, which come with the server, are installed and that they are at the latest level.
- Make sure that the Ethernet cable is installed correctly.
 - The cable must be securely attached at all connections. If the cable is attached but the problem remains, try a different cable.
 - If you set the Ethernet controller to operate at 100 Mbps, you must use Category 5 cabling.
 - If you directly connect two servers (without a hub), or if you are not using a hub with X ports, use a crossover cable. To determine whether a hub has an X port, check the port label. If the label contains an X, the hub has an X port.
- Determine whether the hub supports auto-negotiation. If it does not, try configuring the integrated Ethernet controller manually to match the speed and duplex mode of the hub.
- Check the Ethernet controller LEDs on the rear panel of the server. These LEDs indicate whether there is a problem with the connector, cable, or hub.
 - The Ethernet link status LED is lit when the Ethernet controller receives a link pulse from the hub. If the LED is off, there might be a defective connector or cable or a problem with the hub.
 - The Ethernet transmit/receive activity LED is lit when the Ethernet controller sends or receives data over the Ethernet network. If the Ethernet transmit/receive activity light is off, make sure that the hub and network are operating and that the correct device drivers are installed.
- · Check the LAN activity LED on the rear of the server. The LAN activity LED is lit when data is active on the Ethernet network. If the LAN activity LED is off, make sure that the hub and network are operating and that the correct device drivers are installed.
- · Check for operating-system-specific causes of the problem.
- · Make sure that the device drivers on the client and server are using the same protocol.

If the Ethernet controller still cannot connect to the network but the hardware appears to be working, the network administrator must investigate other possible causes of the error.

Solving undetermined problems

If the diagnostic tests did not diagnose the failure or if the server is inoperative, use the information in this section.

If you suspect that a software problem is causing failures (continuous or intermittent), see "Software problems" on page 67.

Damaged data in CMOS memory or damaged server firmware can cause undetermined problems. To reset the CMOS data, use the clear CMOS jumber to clear the CMOS memory; see "System-board jumpers and switches" on page 20. If you suspect that the server firmware is damaged, see "Recovering the server firmware" on page 124.

Check the LEDs on all the power supplies. If the LEDs indicate that the power supplies are working correctly, complete the following steps:

- 1. Turn off the server.
- 2. Make sure that the server is cabled correctly.
- 3. Remove or disconnect the following devices, one at a time, until you find the failure. Turn on the server and reconfigure it each time.
 - · Any external devices.
 - Surge-suppressor device (on the server).
 - · Modem, printer, mouse, and non-IBM devices.
 - · Each adapter.
 - · Hard disk drives.
 - · Memory modules. The minimum configuration requirement is one 1 GB DIMM on the system board.

The following minimum configuration is required for the server to start:

- · One microprocessor
- · One 1 GB DIMM on the system board
- One power supply
- · Power cord
- ServeRAID SAS/SATA adapter
- System board
- 4. Turn on the server. If the problem remains, suspect the following components in the following order:
 - a. Memory module
 - b. Microprocessor
 - c. System board


If the problem is solved when you remove an adapter from the server but the problem recurs when you reinstall the same adapter, suspect the adapter; if the problem recurs when you replace the adapter with a different one, suspect the system board.

If you suspect a networking problem and the server passes all the system tests, suspect a network cabling problem that is external to the server.

Problem determination tips

Because of the variety of hardware and software combinations that can encounter, use the following information to assist you in problem determination. If possible, have this information available when requesting assistance from IBM.

The model number and serial number of the server are located on the bottom on the right side of the bezel, as shown in the following illustration.



- Machine type and model
- Microprocessor or hard disk drive upgrades
- Failure symptom
 - Does the server fail the diagnostic tests?
 - What occurs? When? Where?
 - Does the failure occur on a single server or on multiple servers?
 - Is the failure repeatable?
 - Has this configuration ever worked?
 - What changes, if any, were made before the configuration failed?
 - Is this the original reported failure?
- · Diagnostic program type and version level
- Hardware configuration (print screen of the system summary)
- IMM firmware level
- · Operating system software

You can solve some problems by comparing the configuration and software setups between working and nonworking servers. When you compare servers to each other for diagnostic purposes, consider them identical only if all the following factors are exactly the same in all the servers:

- Machine type and model
- IMM firmware level

- Adapters and attachments, in the same locations
- · Address jumpers, terminators, and cabling
- · Software versions and levels
- · Diagnostic program type and version level
- · Configuration option settings
- Operating-system control-file setup

Replaceable server components

The four types of replaceable components are:

- Consumables: Purchase and replacement of consumables (components, such as batteries and printer cartridges, that have depleting life) is your responsibility.
 If IBM acquires or installs a consumable component at your request, you will be charged for the service.
- Tier 1 customer replaceable unit (CRU): Replacement of Tier 1 CRUs is your responsibility. If IBM installs a Tier 1 CRU at your request, you will be charged for the installation.
- Tier 2 customer replaceable unit: You may install a Tier 2 CRU yourself or request IBM to install it, at no additional charge, under the type of warranty service that is designated for your server.
- Field replaceable unit (FRU): FRUs must be installed only by trained service technicians.

For information about the terms of the warranty and getting service and assistance, see the *Warranty Information* document that comes with the server.

The following illustration shows the major components in the server. The illustrations in this document might differ slightly from your hardware.

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

Chapter 5. Removing and replacing server components

Replaceable components are of three types:

- Tier 1 customer replaceable unit (CRU): Replacement of Tier 1 CRUs is your responsibility. If IBM installs a Tier 1 CRU at your request, you will be charged for the installation.
- Tier 2 customer replaceable unit: You may install a Tier 2 CRU yourself or request IBM to install it, at no additional charge, under the type of warranty service that is designated for your server.
- Field replaceable unit (FRU): FRUs must be installed only by trained service technicians.

See Chapter 4, "Parts listing, System x3200 M3 Types 7327 and 7328," on page 133 to determine whether a component is a Tier 1 CRU, Tier 2 CRU, or FRU.

For information about the terms of the warranty and getting service and assistance, see the *Warranty Information* document that comes with the server.

Installation guidelines

Attention:

- Static electricity that is released to internal server components when the server is
 powered-on might cause the system to halt, which might result in the loss of
 data. To avoid this potential problem, always use an electrostatic-discharge wrist
 strap or other grounding system when removing or installing a hot-swap device.
- This product is not intended to be connected directly or indirectly by any means
 whatsoever to interfaces of public telecommunications networks, neither to be

Before you remove or replace a component, read the following information:

- Read the safety information that begins on page vii and the guidelines in "Handling static-sensitive devices" on page 144. This information will help you work safely.
- When you install your new server, take the opportunity to download and apply
 the most recent firmware updates. This step will help to ensure that any known
 issues are addressed and that your server is ready to function at maximum levels
 of performance. To download firmware updates for your server, complete the
 following steps.

Note: Changes are made periodically to the IBM Web site. The actual procedure might vary slightly from what is described in this document.

 Before you install optional devices, make sure that the server is working correctly. Start the server, and make sure that the operating system starts, if an

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operating system is installed, or that a 19990305 error code is displayed, indicating that an operating system was not found but the server is otherwise working correctly. If the server is not working correctly, see Chapter 1, "Start here," on page 1 and Chapter 3, "Diagnostics," on page 23 for diagnostic information.

- · Observe good housekeeping in the area where you are working. Place removed covers and other parts in a safe place.
- · If you must start the server while the cover is removed, make sure that no one is near the server and that no other objects have been left inside the server.
- · Do not attempt to lift an object that you think is too heavy for you. If you have to lift a heavy object, observe the following precautions:
 - Make sure that you stand safely without slipping.
 - Distribute the weight of the object equally between your feet.
 - Use a slow lifting force. Never move suddenly or twist when you lift a heavy object.
 - To avoid straining the muscles in your back, lift by standing or by pushing up with your leg muscles
- · Make sure that you have an adequate number of properly grounded electrical outlets for the server, monitor, and other devices.
- · Back up all important data before you make changes to disk drives.
- Have a small flat-blade screwdriver, a small Phillips screwdriver, and a T8 torx screwdriver available.
- · You do not have to turn off the server to install or replace hot-swap fans, hot-swap hard disk drives, hot-plug adapters, or hot-plug Universal Serial Bus (USB) devices. However, you must turn off the server before performing any steps that involve removing or installing adapter cables.
- Blue on a component indicates touch points, where you can grip the component to remove it from or install it in the server, open or close a latch, and so on.
- Orange on a component or an orange label on or near a component indicates that the component can be hot-swapped, which means that if the server and operating system support hot-swap capability, you can remove or install the component while the server is running. (Orange can also indicate touch points on hot-swap components.) See the instructions for removing or installing a specific hot-swap component for any additional procedures that you might have to perform before you remove or install the component.
- When you are finished working on the server, reinstall all safety shields, guards, labels, and ground wires.
- For a list of supported optional devices for the server, see http://www.ibm.com/ servers/eserver/serverproven/compat/us/.

System reliability quidelines

To help ensure proper cooling and system reliability, make sure that the following requirements are met:

- Each of the drive bays has a drive or a filler panel and electromagnetic compatibility (EMC) shield installed in it.
- There is adequate space around the server to allow the server cooling system to work properly. Leave approximately 50 mm (2 in.) of open space around the front and rear of the server. Do not place objects in front of the fans. For proper cooling and airflow, replace the server cover before turning on the server. Operating the server for extended periods of time (more than 30 minutes) with the server cover removed might damage server components.

- You have followed the cabling instructions that come with optional adapters.
- · You have replaced a failed fan within 48 hours.
- You have replaced a hot-swap fan within 30 seconds of removal.
- You have replaced a hot-swap drive within 10 minutes of removal.
- · You do not run the server without the air baffle installed. Operating the server without the air baffle might cause the microprocessor or the DIMMs to overheat.
- The microprocessor socket always contains a microprocessor and heat sink.

Working inside the server with the power on

Attention: Static electricity that is released to internal server components when the server is powered-on might cause the server to halt, which might result in the loss of data. To avoid this potential problem, always use an electrostatic-discharge wrist strap or other grounding system when working inside the server with the power on.

You might have to have the server turned on while the cover is off, to look at LEDs or replace hot swap components. Follow these guidelines when you work inside a server that is turned on:

- · Avoid wearing loose-fitting clothing on your forearms. Button long-sleeved shirts before you work inside the server; do not wear cuff links while you are working inside the server.
- · Do not allow your necktie or scarf to hang inside the server.
- Remove jewelry, such as bracelets, necklaces, rings, and loose-fitting wrist watches.
- Remove items from your shirt pocket, such as pens and pencils, that might fall into the server as you lean over it.
- Avoid dropping any metallic objects, such as paper clips, hairpins, and screws, into the server.

Handling static-sensitive devices

Attention: Static electricity can damage the server and other electronic devices. To avoid damage, keep static-sensitive devices in their static-protective packages until you are ready to install them.

To reduce the possibility of damage from electrostatic discharge, observe the following precautions:

- · Limit your movement. Movement can cause static electricity to build up around you.
- The use of a grounding system is recommended. For example, wear an electrostatic-discharge wrist strap, if one is available. Always use an electrostatic-discharge wrist strap or other grounding system when working inside the server with the power on.
- Handle the device carefully, holding it by its edges or its frame.
- · Do not touch solder joints, pins, or exposed circuitry.
- Do not leave the device where others can handle and damage it.
- While the device is still in its static-protective package, touch it to an unpainted metal part on the outside of the server for at least 2 seconds. This drains static electricity from the package and from your body.
- Remove the device from its package and install it directly into the server without setting down the device. If it is necessary to set down the device, put it back into its static-protective package. Do not place the device on the server cover or on a metal surface.
- Take additional care when handling devices during cold weather. Heating reduces indoor humidity and increases static electricity.

Returning a device or component

If you are instructed to return a device or component, follow all packaging instructions, and use any packaging materials for shipping that are supplied to you.

Removing and replacing consumable parts and Tier 1 CRUs

Replacement of consumable parts and Tier 1 CRUs is your responsibility. If IBM installs a consumable part or a Tier 1 CRU at your request, you will be charged for the installation.



Removing the side cover

Attention: Operating the server for more than 30 minutes with the side cover removed might damage server components. For proper cooling and airflow, replace the side cover before you turn on the server.

To remove the side cover, complete the following steps:

- 1. Read the safety information that begins on page vii and "Installation guidelines" on page 141.
- 2. Turn off the server and all attached devices; then, disconnect all power cords and external cables.
- 3. Unlock the side cover; then, press the cover-release latch down (as shown in the illustration); then, remove the cover and set it aside.



4. If you are instructed to return the side cover, follow all packaging instructions, and use any packaging materials for shipping that are supplied to you.

Installing the side cover


Attention: For proper cooling and airflow, replace the side cover before turning on the server. Operating the server for extended periods of time (more than 30 minutes) with the side cover removed might damage server components.

To install the side cover, complete the following steps:

- 1. Make sure that all cables, adapters, and other components are installed and seated correctly and that you have not left loose tools or parts inside the server. Also, make sure that all internal cables are correctly routed.
- 2. If you removed the upper and lower bezels, reinstall them before you replace the side cover (see "Installing the upper bezel" on page 150 and "Installing the lower bezel" on page 148).

Important: The cover lock must be in the unlocked (opened) position before you install the side cover.

3. Position the lip on the bottom edge of the side cover on the ledge on the bottom of the chassis; then, rotate the cover up to the chassis. Press down on the cover release latch and push the cover completely closed until it latches securely into place.




- 4. Lock the side cover.
- 5. Reconnect the external cables and power cords; then, turn on the attached devices and turn on the server.

Removing the lower bezel

When you work with some devices, such as the drives in bays 4 through 7 (or bays 4 through 11 for some 2.5 inch hard disk drive models), you must first remove the lower bezel to access the devices.

To remove the lower bezel, complete the following steps:

- 1. Read the safety information that begins on page vii and "Installation guidelines" on page 141.
- 2. If you are replacing a non-hot-swap component, turn off the server and all attached devices; then, disconnect all power cords and external cables.
- 3. Press the round blue release button on the right side of the lower bezel and rotate the lower bezel downward to disengage and remove it from the chassis.




4. If you are instructed to return the lower bezel, follow all packaging instructions, and use any packaging materials for shipping that are supplied to you.

Installing the lower bezel

To install the lower bezel, complete the following steps:

1. Insert the two bottom tabs on the lower bezel into the corresponding holes in the front of the chassis.




- 2. Rotate the top of the lower bezel up to the chassis; then, press the blue release tab on the right side of the lower bezel and completely close the lower bezel until it locks securely into place.
- 3. Reconnect the external cables and power cords; then, turn on the attached devices and turn on the server.

Removing the upper bezel

When you work with some devices, such as the drives in bays 1 through 3, you must first remove the upper bezel to access the devices.

To remove the upper bezel, complete the following steps:

- 1. Read the safety information that begins on page vii and "Installation guidelines" on page 141.
- 2. If you are replacing a non-hot-swap component, turn off the server and all attached devices; then, disconnect all power cords and external cables.
- 3. Unlock and remove the side cover (see "Removing the side cover" on page 145).
- 4. Remove the lower bezel (see "Removing the lower bezel" on page 147).
- 5. Carefully pull the two bezel clips on the left side of the upper bezel; then, rotate the upper bezel to the right side of the server to disengage the two right-side tabs from the chassis.




6. If you are instructed to return the upper bezel, follow all packaging instructions, and use any packaging materials for shipping that are supplied to you.

Installing the upper bezel

To install the upper bezel, complete the following steps:

1. Insert the two tabs on the right-side of the upper bezel into the corresponding holes on the right side of the chassis.




- 2. Rotate the upper bezel to the left side of the chassis until the bezel clips are aligned with the corresponding indentations on the left side of the chassis and it snaps into place.
- 3. Install the lower bezel (see "Installing the lower bezel" on page 148).
- 4. Install the side cover (see "Installing the side cover" on page 146).
- 5. Lock the side cover.
- 6. Reconnect the external cables and power cords; then, turn on the attached devices and turn on the server.

Removing an adapter

To remove an adapter, complete the following steps:

- 1. Read the safety information that begins on page vii and "Installation guidelines" on page 141.
- 2. Turn off the server and all attached devices; then, disconnect all power cords and external cables.
- 3. Unlock and remove the side cover (see "Removing the side cover" on page 145).
- 4. Disconnect any cables from the adapter or any cables that impede access to the adapter.
- 5. Open the rear retention bracket.
- 6. If you are removing a full-length adapter, press on the retaining tab (two blue pull points) on the left side of the front adapter-retention bracket until the release lever on the right side of the bracket clicks into place.
- 7. Remove the expansion-slot screw at the rear of the adapter if any.
- 8. Carefully grasp the adapter by its top edge or upper corners. And pull the adapter from the server.

Attention: Expansion-slot covers must be installed in all empty slots. This maintains the electronic emissions standards of the computer and ensures proper ventilation of computer components.



- 9. If you are not replacing the adapter, install an expansion-slot cover in the expansion-slot opening.
- 10. If you are instructed to return the adapter, follow all packaging instructions, and use any packaging materials for shipping that are supplied to you.



Note: If you are installing Intel Ethernet Quad Port Server Adapter I340-T4 (part number 49Y4240), you can only install the adaptor in slot 1 or slot 2.


To install a replacement adapter, complete the following steps:

- 1. Check the instructions that come with the adapter for any requirements, restrictions, or cabling instructions. It might be easier to route cables before you install the adapter.
- 2. Follow the instructions that come with the adapter to set jumpers or switches, if
- 3. Touch the static-protective package that contains the adapter to any unpainted metal surface on the server. Then, remove the adapter from the static-protective package. Avoid touching the components and gold-edge connectors on the adapter.
- 4. If you are installing a full-length adapter, remove the blue adapter guide (if any) from the end of the adapter.



- Open the rear retention bracket.
- 6. Carefully grasp the adapter by the top edge or upper corner, and move the adapter directly from the static-protective package to the expansion slot. Align the adapter with the expansion slot guides; then, press the adapter firmly into the expansion slot. For a full-length adapter, make sure that the front edge of the adapter is correctly seated in the correct slot in the front adapter-retention

bracket.




- 7. (Optional) Install an expansion-slot screw at the rear of the adapter.
- 8. If you are installing a full-length adapter, press on the release lever on the right side of the front adapter-retention bracket to release the retaining tab on the left side of the bracket.
- 9. Connect required cables to the adapter. Route cables so that they do not block the flow of air from the fans.
- 10. Close the rear retention bracket.
- 11. Install and lock the side cover (see "Installing the side cover" on page 146).
- 12. Reconnect the external cables and power cords; then, turn on the attached devices and turn on the server.

Removing and installing internal drives

See the *Installation and User's Guide* for information about the types of drives that the server supports and other important information. The following illustrations show the locations of the drive bays. Some models have seven drive bays, and some models have eleven drive bays.

Table 7. Drive bays on the server models




The following notes describe the types of drives that the server supports and other information that you must consider when installing a drive:

- Make sure that you have all the cables and other equipment that is specified in the documentation that comes with the drive.
- Check the instructions that come with the drive to see whether you have to set any switches or jumpers on the drive. If you are installing a SAS or SATA device, be sure to set the SAS or SATA ID for that device.
- Optional external tape drives, DVD-ROM drive are examples of removable-media drives. You can install removable-media drives only in bays 1, 2, and 3.
- To install a 3.5-inch drive in a 5.25-inch bay, you must use a 5.25-inch conversion kit.
- The electromagnetic interference (EMI) integrity and cooling of the server are
 protected by having all bays and PCI slots covered or occupied. When you install
 a drive or PCI adapter, save the EMC shield and filler panel from the bay or the
 PCI adapter slot cover in the event that you later remove the drive or adapter.

Removing a DVD drive

To remove a DVD drive, complete the following steps:

Installing a DVD drive

To install a DVD drive, complete the following steps:

- 1. If you are replacing a removed drive with a new drive, make sure that:
 - · You have all the cables and other equipment that is specified in the documentation that comes with the new drive.
 - You have checked the instructions that come with the new drive to determine whether you must set any switches or jumpers in the drive.
 - · You have removed the blue optical drive rails from the side of the old drive and have them available for installation on the new drive.

Note: If you are installing a drive that contains a laser, observe the following safety precaution.

When laser products (such as CD-ROMs, DVD drives, fiber optic devices, or transmitters) are installed, note the following:





- 9. Install and lock the side cover (see "Installing the side cover" on page 146).
- 10. Reconnect the external cables and power cords; then, turn on the attached devices and turn on the server.

Removing a tape drive

To remove a tape drive, complete the following steps:

- 2. Turn off the server and peripheral devices, and disconnect the power cords and all external cables.
- 3. Unlock and remove the side cover (see "Installing the side cover" on page 146).
- 4. Remove the lower bezel (see "Installing the lower bezel" on page 148).
- 5. Remove the upper bezel (see "Installing the upper bezel" on page 150).
- 6. Disconnect the power and signal cables from the drive that is to be removed.
- 7. Press and hold the blue release button on the side of the bay to release the drive; then, pull the drive out of the front of the server.
- 8. Remove the drive retainer clip from the side of the drive. Save the clip to use when you install the replacement drive.




9. If you are instructed to return the drive, follow all packaging instructions, and use any packaging materials for shipping that are supplied to you.

Installing a tape drive

To install a tape drive, complete the following steps:

- 1. If you are replacing a removed drive with a new drive, make sure that:
 - You have all the cables and other equipment that is specified in the documentation that comes with the new drive.
 - You check the instructions that come with the new drive to determine whether you must set any switches or jumpers on the drive.
 - You have removed the drive retainer clip on the side of the old drive and have it available for installation on the new drive.
- 2. Read the safety information that begins on page vii and "Installation guidelines" on page 141.
- 3. Turn off the server and peripheral devices, and disconnect the power cords and all external cables.
- 4. Unlock and remove the side cover (see "Installing the side cover" on page 146).
- 5. Remove the lower bezel (see "Installing the lower bezel" on page 148).
- 6. Remove the upper bezel (see "Installing the upper bezel" on page 150).
- 7. Touch the static-protective package that contains the drive to any unpainted metal surface on the server; then, remove the drive from the package and place it on a static-protective surface.
- 8. Set any jumpers or switches on the drive according to the documentation that comes with the drive.
- 9. Remove the drive retainer clip from the side of the drive cage of bay 1 or bay 2. Slide the drive retainer clip to the front to remove it from the drive cage; then, snap the drive retainer clip into the screw holes on the side of the drive.



- 10. Remove the EMC filler.
- 11. Push the drive into the bay.

Note: A tape drive can be installed in bay 1 or bay 2

- 12. Connect one end of the applicable signal cable into the rear of the drive and make sure that the other end of this cable is connected into the applicable connector on the system board.
- 13. Route the signal cable so that it does not block the airflow to the rear of the drives or over the microprocessor and dual inline memory modules (DIMMs).
- 14. If you have another drive to install or remove, do so now.
- 15. Connect the power cable to the rear of the drive. The connectors are keyed and can be inserted only one way.

Removing a hot-swap hard disk drive

This procedure applies only to server models that have hot-swap hard disk drives.


Attention: To maintain proper system cooling, do not operate the server for more than 10 minutes without either a drive or a filler panel installed in each drive bay.

To remove a hot-swap hard disk drive, complete the following steps:

1. Read the safety information that begins on page vii and "Installation guidelines" on page 141.

Note: You do not have to turn off the server to remove hot-swap drives from the hot-swap drive bays.

- 2. Remove the lower bezel (see "Removing the lower bezel" on page 147).
- 3. Rotate the drive tray handle of the drive assembly that is to be removed to the open position (based on your model).





Installing a hot-swap hard disk drive

This procedure applies only to server models that have hot-swap hard disk drives. Before you install a hot-swap hard disk drive, read the following information:

- The hot-swap drives must be either all SAS hard disk drives or all SATA hard disk drives; the two types cannot be combined.
- · Inspect the drive tray for signs of damage.
- To maintain proper system cooling, do not operate the server for more than 10 minutes without either a drive or a filler panel installed in each drive bay.
- You do not have to turn off the server to install hot-swap drives in the hot-swap drive bays.
- · See the Installation and User's Guide for additional information.

To install a hot-swap hard disk drive (based on your model), complete the following steps.



- 1. Touch the static-protective package that contains the drive to any unpainted metal surface on the server; then, remove the drive from the package and place it on a static-protective surface.
- 2. Make sure that the drive tray handle is in the open position.
- 3. Align the drive assembly with the guide rails in the bay; then, carefully slide the drive assembly into the drive bay until the drive stops.
- 4. Rotate the drive tray handle to the closed position.
- 5. Check the hard disk drive status indicator to make sure that the hard disk drive is operating correctly. (You might have to restart the server for the drive to be recognized.) If the amber hard disk drive status LED for a drive is lit continuously, it indicates that the drive is faulty and must be replaced. If the green hard disk drive activity LED is flashing, this indicates that the drive is being accessed.

Note: If the server is configured for RAID operation using a ServeRAID controller, you might have to reconfigure the disk arrays after you replace hard disk drives. See the ServeRAID documentation for additional information about RAID operation and complete instructions for using ServeRAID Manager.

- 6. Install the lower bezel (see "Installing the lower bezel" on page 148).
- 7. Lock the side cover.


Removing a simple-swap hard disk drive

This procedure applies only to server models that have simple-swap SATA hard disk drives.

Attention: Simple-swap hard disk drives are not hot-swappable. Disconnect all power from the server before you remove or install a simple-swap hard disk drive.



This procedure applies only to server models that have simple-swap SATA hard disk drives. See the Installation and User's Guide for information about the installation sequence and other important information.

Attention: Simple-swap hard disk drives are not hot-swappable. Disconnect all power from the server you remove or install a simple-swap hard disk drive.

To install a simple-swap hard disk drive, complete the following steps:

- 1. Touch the static-protective package that contains the drive to any unpainted metal surface on the server; then, remove the drive from the package and place it on a static-protective surface.
- 2. Align the drive assembly with the guide rails in the bay.



3. Pull the loops of the drive assembly toward each other; then, carefully slide the drive assembly into the drive bay until it clicks into place, and release the loops.

Note: Do not release the loops on the drive assembly until it is completely seated.

- 4. Install the lower bezel (see "Installing the lower bezel" on page 148).
- 5. Lock the side cover.
- 6. Reconnect the external cables and power cords; then, turn on the attached devices and turn on the server.

Removing a hot-swap power supply

This procedure applies only to server models that have hot-swap power supplies. See "Removing a non-hot-swap power supply" on page 206 for information about the removal of a non-hot-swap power supply.

When you remove or install a hot-swap power supply, observe the following precautions.



- 3. Press down on the orange release lever and pull the power supply out of the bay, using the handle.





Installing a hot-swap power supply

To install a hot-swap power supply, complete the following steps:

1. Place the power supply into the bay guides.



- 2. Using the handle, push the power supply toward the front of the chassis until it locks into place.
- Connect one end of the power cord into the connector on the back of the power supply and connect the other end of the power cord into a properly grounded electrical outlet.
- 4. Make sure that both the ac and dc power LEDs on the rear of the power supply are lit, indicating that the power supply is operating correctly.



- 2. Turn off the server and all attached devices; then, disconnect all power cords.
- 3. Unlock and remove the side cover (see "Removing the side cover" on page 145).
- 4. Locate the DIMM connector that contains the DIMM that is to be replaced (see "System-board optional-devices connectors" on page 18 for DIMM slot locations).

Attention: To avoid breaking the DIMM retaining clips or damaging the DIMM connectors, open and close the clips gently.

5. Carefully open the retaining clips on each end of the DIMM connector and remove the DIMM.



6. If you are instructed to return the DIMM, follow all packaging instructions, and use any packaging materials for shipping that are supplied to you.

Installing a memory module

The following notes describe the types of dual inline memory modules (DIMMs) that the server supports and other information that you must consider when you install DIMMs (see "System-board optional-devices connectors" on page 18 for the location of the DIMM connectors):

- The server supports industry-standard, 1066 or 1333 MHz, PC3-10600R-999 (single-rank or dual-rank) double-data-rate 3 (DDR3), registered or unbuffered. synchronous dynamic random-access memory (SDRAM) dual inline memory modules (DIMMs) with error correcting code (ECC). For a list of supported options for the server, see http://www.ibm.com/servers/eserver/serverproven/ compat/us/; then, select your country and navigate to the list of options for the server.
- The maximum amount of memory that the server supports is dependent on the type of memory that you install in the server. See "Unbuffered DIMMs (UDIMMs)" on page 170 and "Registered DIMMs (RDIMMs)" on page 171 for more information.
- · The amount of usable memory is reduced, depending on the system configuration. A certain amount of memory must be reserved for system resources. To view the total amount of installed memory and the amount of configured memory, run the Setup utility. For additional information, see "Using the Setup utility" on page 225.
- The maximum operating speed of the server is determined by the slowest DIMM in the server.
- · If you install a pair of DIMMs in DIMM connectors 2 and 5, the size and speed of the DIMMs that you install in DIMM connectors 2 and 5 must match each other. How ever, they do not have to be the same size and speed as the DIMMs that are installed in DIMM connectors 1 and 4.
- You can use compatible DIMMs from various manufacturers in the same pair.
- When you install or remove DIMMs, the server configuration information changes. When you restart the server, the system displays a message that indicates that the memory configuration has changed.

Attention: Static electricity that is released to internal server components when the server is powered-on might cause the server to stop, which could result in the loss of data. To avoid this potential problem, always use an electrostatic-discharge wrist strap or other grounding system when working inside the server with the power on.

The specifications of a DDR3 DIMM are on a label on the DIMM, in the following format.





Installing an optional ServeRAID-MR10i SAS/SATA controller


The optional IBM ServeRAID-MR10i SAS/SATA controller can be installed in either PCI slot 1 or slot 2 on the system board. The ServeRAID-MR10i adapter is supported on hot-swap server models only. The IBM ServeRAID-MR10i SAS/SATA adapter enables integrated RAID levels 0, 1, 5, 6, and 10 support capability on hot-swap hard disk drives. For configuration information, see the documentation on the ServeRAID CD that comes with the adapter.

Important: To ensure that any of your ServeRAID 10i, 10is, or 10M adapters function properly on UEFI-based servers, make sure that the adapter firmware level is updated to at least 11.xx-XXX, and the supporting drivers.

Attention: Some cluster solutions require specific code levels or coordinated code updates. If the device is part of a cluster solution, verify that the latest level of code is supported for the cluster solution before you update the code.

To install a ServeRAID-MR10i adapter, complete the following steps:


- 1. Read the safety information beginning on page vii, and "Installation guidelines" on page 141.
- 2. Touch the static-protective package containing the ServeRAID-MR10i adapter to any unpainted metal surface on the server. Then, remove the ServeRAID-MR10i adapter from the package.



- 8. Lock the side cover if you unlocked it during removal.

9. Reconnect the external cables and power cords; then, turn on the attached devices and turn on the server.


Removing the rear adapter retention bracket

To remove the rear adapter-retention bracket, complete the following steps:

- 1. Turn off the server and all attached devices; then, disconnect all power cords and external cables.
- 2. Unlock and remove the side cover (see "Removing the side cover" on page
- 3. Remove all adapters (if necessary) and place the adapters on static-protective surface.

Note: You might find it helpful to note where each adapter is installed before you remove the adapters.

- 4. Release the rear adapter-retention bracket by lifting up on the rear adapter-retention bracket, and rotate the bracket partially toward the closed position.
- 5. Grasp the bracket on one side at the hinge point and pull inward (while you rotate the bracket slightly toward the front of the server) until the bracket is free of the hinge pin; then, grasp the bracket on the other side at the hinge point, pull inward until the bracket is free of the hinge pin, and remove the rear adapter-retention bracket from the server.



Installing the rear adapter retention bracket

To install the rear adapter-retention bracket, complete the following steps:

- 1. Position the rear adapter retention bracket so that the hole in one of the hinge points is aligned with the hinge pin on the chassis; then, place the hinge pin through the hole on the chassis.
- 2. Rotate the rear adapter-retention bracket into place so that the hole in the opposite hinge point snaps into place over the hinge pin on the chassis.
- 3. Install the adapters.
- 4. Install the side cover (see "Installing the side cover" on page 146).
- 5. Lock the side cover if you unlocked it during removal.
- 6. Reconnect the external cables and power cords; then, turn on the attached devices and turn on the server.

Removing the front adapter-retention bracket

To remove the front adapter-retention bracket, complete the following steps:

- 1. Read the safety information that begins on page vii and "Installation guidelines" on page 141.
- 2. Turn off the server and all attached devices; then, disconnect all power cords and external cables.
- 3. Unlock and remove the side cover (see "Removing the side cover" on page
- 4. Open the front and rear adapter-retention brackets.
- 5. Remove all adapters (if necessary) and place them on a static-protective surface.

Note: You might find it helpful to note where each adapter is installed before you remove the adapters.

6. Grasp one side of the bracket at a hinge point and pull outward (while you rotate the bracket slightly toward the rear of the server) until the hinge pin on the bracket is free of the hole; then, grasp the bracket on the other side at the hinge point, pull outward until the bracket is free of the hinge pin, and remove the rear adapter-retention bracket from the server.

Installing the front adapter-retention bracket

To install the front adapter-retention bracket, complete the following steps:

- 1. Insert one of the hinge pins on the front adapter-retention bracket into the metal hinge point on the fan cage assembly.
- 2. Rotate the other hinge pin on the front adapter-retention bracket into position and push the hinge pin into the other metal hinge point. The hinge pin will protrude through the hole in the metal hinge point when the adapter-retention bracket is seated correctly.
- 3. Reinstall any adapters that you removed earlier.
- 4. Close the front and rear adapter retention brackets.
- 5. Install the side cover (see "Installing the side cover" on page 146).
- 6. Lock the side cover.
- 7. Reconnect the external cables and power cords; then, turn on the attached devices and turn on the server.

Removing the hot-swap power supply cage


This procedure applies only to server models that have hot-swap power-supplies.

To remove the power-supply cage, complete the following steps:

- 1. Read the safety information that begins on page vii and "Installation guidelines" on page 141.
- 2. Turn off the server and all attached devices; then, disconnect all power cords and external cables.
- 3. Unlock and remove the side cover (see "Removing the side cover" on page
- 4. Remove the hot-swap power supplies (see "Removing a hot-swap power supply" on page 165).

Note: It might be helpful to lay the server on its side for the remainder of this procedure.

- 5. Disconnect the cables from the power-supply cage to the system board and all internal components.
- 6. Remove the four black screws that secure the power-supply cage to the chassis; then, slide the cage toward the front of the server to disengage the retaining clips from the top of the chassis and lift the cage out of the chassis.




7. If you are instructed to return the power-supply cage, follow all packaging instructions, and use any packaging materials for shipping that are supplied to you.

Installing the hot-swap power supply cage

This procedure applies only to server models that have hot-swap power-supplies.

To install the hot-swap power supply cage, complete the following steps:

1. Place the power-supply cage into the chassis and slide it toward the rear of the server until the retaining clips engage the top of the chassis.



- 2. Install the four screws that secure the power-supply cage to the chassis.
- 3. Connect the cables from the power-supply cage to the system board and all internal components (see "System-board internal connectors" on page 16 for the locations of the internal connectors).
- 4. Reinstall both hot-swap power supplies (see "Installing a hot-swap power supply" on page 167).
- 5. Install the side cover (see "Installing the side cover" on page 146).
- 6. Lock the side cover if you unlocked it during removal.
- 7. Reconnect the external cables and power cords; then, turn on the attached devices and turn on the server.

Removing and replacing FRUs

Field replaceable units (FRUs) must be installed only by trained service technicians.


Removing a ServeRAID-BR10il v2 SAS/SATA controller

To remove the mini-SAS/SATA RAID controller, complete the following steps:

- 1. Read the safety information that begins on page vii and "Installation guidelines" on page 141.
- 2. Turn off the server and all attached devices; then, disconnect all power cords and external cables.

Note: When you disconnect the power source from the server, you lose the ability to view the LEDs because the LEDs are not lit when the power source is removed. Before you disconnect the power source, make a note of which LEDs are lit, including the LEDs that are lit on the operation information panel and LEDs inside the server on the system board.

- 3. Unlock and remove the side cover (see "Removing the side cover" on page 145).
- 4. Open the rear adapter-retention bracket until the release lever on the right side of the bracket clicks into place.
- 5. Squeeze the tabs on both sides of the connector on the signal cable and remove the cable from the SAS/SATA controller.




- 6. Carefully disengage the tabs on each side of the SAS/SATA controller connector and the front of the SAS/SATA controller from the plastic standoff.
- 7. Grasp the edges of the SAS/SATA controller and pull it out of the connector. If the standoff comes away from the system board with the controller, gently pull it out of the controller and push it back into the hole on the system board.
- 8. If you are instructed to return the SAS/SATA controller, follow all packaging instructions, and use any packaging materials for shipping that are supplied to you.

Installing a ServeRAID-BR10il v2 SAS/SATA controller

To install the SAS/SATA RAID controller, complete the following steps:

- 1. Touch the static-protective package that contains the SAS/SATA controller to any unpainted surface on the outside of the server; then, remove the SAS/SATA controller from the package.
- 2. Position the SAS/SATA controller over the connector and the plastic standoff; then, press the SAS/SATA controller firmly into the connector and onto the plastic standoff.



- 3. Connect the signal cable to the SAS/SATA controller.
- 4. Install and lock the side cover (see "Installing the side cover" on page 146).
- 5. Reconnect the external cables and power cords; then, turn on the attached devices and turn on the server.

Removing a non-hot-swap power supply

This procedure applies only to server models that have a non-hot-swap power supply. See "Removing a hot-swap power supply" on page 165 for information about the removal of a hot-swap power supply.

When you remove or install a non-hot-swap power supply, observe the following precautions.

CAUTION:

Never remove the cover on a power supply or any part that has the following label attached.



Hazardous voltage, current, and energy levels are present inside any component that has this label attached. There are no serviceable parts inside these components. If you suspect a problem with one of these parts, contact a service technician.

To remove a non-hot-swap power supply, complete the following steps:


- 1. Read the safety information that begins on page vii and "Installation guidelines" on page 141.
- 2. Turn off the server and all attached devices; then, disconnect all power cords and external cables.
- 3. Unlock and remove the side cover (see "Removing the side cover" on page 145).

Note: It might be helpful to lay the server on its side for the remainder of this procedure.

4. Disconnect the cables from the power supply to the system board and all internal components.

Attention: Support the power supply while you remove the mounting screws. After the screws are removed, the power supply is loose and can damage other components in the server.

5. While you support the power supply, remove the four screws that secure it to the chassis; then, lift the power supply out of the chassis. Save the screws to use when you install the replacement power supply.




6. If you are instructed to return the power supply, follow all packaging instructions, and use any packaging materials for shipping that are supplied to you.

Installing a non-hot-swap power supply

This procedure applies only to server models that have a non-hot-swap power supply. See "Installing a hot-swap power supply" on page 167 for information about the installation of a hot-swap power supply.

To install a non-hot-swap power supply, complete the following steps:

1. Position the power supply in the chassis so that the screw holes in the power supply are aligned with the corresponding holes in the rear of the chassis.




- 2. Install the four screws that secure the power supply to the chassis.
- 3. Connect the cables from the power supply to the system board and all internal components (see "System-board internal connectors" on page 16 for the locations of the internal connectors).
- 4. Install the side cover (see "Installing the side cover" on page 146).
- 5. Lock the side cover if you unlocked it during removal.
- 6. Reconnect the external cables and power cords; then, turn on the attached devices and turn on the server.

Removing the microprocessor and fan sink

To remove the microprocessor and fan sink, complete the following steps:

- 1. Read the safety information that begins on page vii and "Installation guidelines" on page 141.
- 2. Turn off the server and all attached devices; then, disconnect all power cords and external cables.
- 3. Turn the server on its side so that it is lying flat, with the cover facing up.
- 4. Unlock and remove the side cover (see "Removing the side cover" on page 145).
- 5. Remove the lower bezel (see "Removing the lower bezel" on page 147).
- 6. Remove the hard disk drives.
- 7. Press and hold the drive cage release tab; then, rotate the drive cage out of the chassis until the retaining tab on top of the cage locks into place.
- 8. Disconnect any cables that impede access to the fan sink and microprocessor. Attention: The fan-sink retention lever is spring-loaded when the fan sink is in place. Releasing the lever too quickly or allowing it to spring upward can damage the fan sink and surrounding components.
- 9. Remove the fan sink from the microprocessor:
 - a. Disconnect the fan-sink cable from the system board.
 - b. Release the fan-sink retention lever by pressing down on the end, moving it to the side and slowly releasing it to the open (up) position.


Important: Be careful when you handle the microprocessor and fan sink. If the microprocessor and fan sink will be reused, do not contaminate the thermal material between them.



c. Tip the top of the fan sink toward the front of the server while you slide it away from the lower flange of the retention module; then, remove it from the server. After removal, place the fan sink on its side on a clean, flat surface.

Attention: The microprocessor retention latch is spring-loaded when the microprocessor is in place. Releasing the latch too quickly or allowing it to spring upward can damage the microprocessor and surrounding components.

- 10. Release the microprocessor retention latch by pressing down on the end, moving it to the side, and slowly releasing it to the open (up) position.
- 11. Open the microprocessor bracket frame by lifting up the tab on the top edge.



- 12. Carefully lift the microprocessor straight up and out of the socket, and place it on a static-protective surface.
- 13. If you are instructed to return the microprocessor and fan sink, follow all packaging instructions, and use any packaging materials for shipping that are supplied to you.

Installing a microprocessor and fan sink

To install the microprocessor, complete the following steps:


- 1. Touch the static-protective package that contains the microprocessor to any unpainted metal surface on the server. Then, remove the microprocessor from the package.
- 2. Remove the protective cover, tape, or label from the surface of the microprocessor socket, if any is present.
- 3. Rotate the release lever on the microprocessor socket to the fully open position.

Attention: Make sure that the release lever on the microprocessor socket is in the fully open position before you insert the microprocessor in the socket. Failure to do so might result in permanent damage to the microprocessor, microprocessor socket, and system board.


4. Carefully grasp the microprocessor and place the microprocessor into the microprocessor socket.

Note: To maintain correct orientation between the microprocessor and the microprocessor socket during installation, observe the following information:

- The microprocessor has two notches that are keyed to two tabs on the sides of the socket.
- · A triangle-shaped indicator on one corner of the microprocessor points to a 45-degree angle on one corner of the socket.
- · Do not use excessive force when you press the microprocessor into the socket.




5. Close the microprocessor bracket frame; then, close the microprocessor retention latch and lock it securely in place.



6. Install the fan sink:

a. Make sure that the fan sink retention lever is in the fully open position.

Important: Be careful when you handle the microprocessor and fan sink. Do not contaminate the thermal material between them.



- b. Slide the bottom edge of the fan sink under the lower flange of the retention module; then, place the top of the fan sink onto the top of the retention module.
- c. Close the fan sink retention lever and lock it securely in place.
- d. Reconnect the fan sink cable to the system board (see "System-board internal connectors" on page 16 for the location of the fan-sink connector).
- 7. Reconnect any cables that you disconnected during the removal of the old microprocessor.
- 8. Rotate the drive cage toward the front of the server until it stops; then, lift and hold the retaining tab on top of the drive cage while you rotate the drive cage into the chassis until it locks into place.
- 9. Reinstall the hard disk drives.

- 10. Install the lower bezel (see "Installing the lower bezel" on page 148).
- 11. Install the side cover (see "Installing the side cover" on page 146).
- 12. Lock the side cover if you unlocked it during removal.
- 13. Reconnect the external cables and power cords; then, turn on the attached devices and turn on the server.

Thermal grease

The thermal grease must be replaced whenever the fan sink has been removed from the top of the microprocessor and is going to be reused or when debris is found in the grease.

When you are installing the fan sink on the same microprocessor that is was removed from, make sure that:

- The thermal grease on the fan sink and microprocessor is not contaminated.
- Additional thermal grease is not added to the existing thermal grease on the fan sink and microprocessor.

Note:


- · Read the Safety information on page vii.
- Read the "Installation guidelines" on page 141.
- Read "Handling static-sensitive devices" on page 144.

To replace damaged or contaminated thermal grease on the microprocessor and fan sink, complete the following steps:

- 1. Place the fan sink on a clean work surface.
- 2. Remove the cleaning pad from its package and unfold it completely.
- 3. Use the cleaning pad to wipe the thermal grease from the bottom of the fan sink.

Note: Make sure that all of the thermal grease is removed.

4. Use a clean area of the cleaning pad to wipe the thermal grease from the microprocessor; then, dispose of the cleaning pad after all of the thermal grease is removed.



5. Use the thermal-grease syringe to place 9 uniformly spaced dots of 0.02 mL each on the top of the microprocessor. The outermost dots must be within approximately 5 mm of the edge of the microprocessor, this is to ensure uniform distribution of the grease.



Note: If the grease is properly applied, approximately half of the grease will remain in the syringe.


6. Install the fan sink onto the microprocessor as described in "Installing a microprocessor and fan sink" on page 211.

Removing the system board


To remove the system board, complete the following steps:

- 1. Read the safety information that begins on page vii and "Installation guidelines" on page 141.
- 2. Turn off the server and all attached devices; then, disconnect all power cords and external cables.
- 3. Turn the server on its side so that it is lying flat, with the cover facing up.
- 4. Unlock and remove the side cover (see "Removing the side cover" on page 145).
- 5. Note where each cable is connected; then, disconnect all cables from the system board.
- 6. Press and hold the drive cage release tab; then, rotate the drive cage out of the chassis until the retaining tab on top of the cage locks into place.
- 7. Remove any of the following components (in addition to others that might not be listed) that are installed on the system board and put them in a safe, static-protective place:
 - · Adapters (see "Removing an adapter" on page 151).
 - SAS/SATA controller (see "Removing a ServeRAID-BR10il v2 SAS/SATA controller" on page 204).
 - Virtual media key (see "Removing the virtual media key" on page 181).
 - Microprocessor and fan sink (see "Removing the microprocessor and fan sink" on page 209).
 - · DIMMs (see "Removing a memory module" on page 168).
 - · Battery (see "Removing the system battery" on page 183).
 - SAS/SATA controller (see "Removing a ServeRAID-BR10il v2 SAS/SATA controller" on page 204).
 - Hypervisor key (see "Removing a USB embedded hypervisor flash device" on page 180).
 - · The fan connector covers.
- 8. Remove the four screws that secure the fan sink retention module and fan sink mounting bracket to the system board; then, set the fan sink retention module, fan sink mounting bracket, and screws aside for use later.

Note: Make sure that you observe the orientation of the fan sink retention module before you move it so that when you reinstall it, you install it in the same orientation.



9. Remove the eight screws (seven in front and one in rear) that secure the system board to the chassis.




10. Slide the system board toward the front of the server to disengage the tabs on the fan sink mounting bracket from the slots on the bottom of the chassis; then, carefully lift the system board out of the server.

- 11. Remove the fan connector covers from fan connectors 1, 3, and 5 on the system board. Then, put the fan connector covers aside for use later.
- 12. If you are instructed to return the system board, follow all packaging instructions, and use any packaging materials for shipping that are supplied to you.


Installing the system board

To install the system board, complete the following steps:

- Touch the static-protective package that contains the system board to any unpainted metal surface on the server. Then, remove the system board from the package.
- 2. Install the fan connector covers removed from the old system board onto fan connectors 1, 3, and 5 on the system board.




3. Place the fan sink mounting bracket underneath the system board and align the holes on fan sink mounting bracket with the four screw holes for the fan sink retention module slot on system board. Place the fan sink retention module on top of the system board and align it with the four screw holes for the fan sink retention module slot (make sure that the fan sink retention module orientation of the is correct). Take the four screws that you removed earlier and secure the fan sink mounting bracket and the fan sink retention module to the system board.



4. Insert the system board into the chassis and slide it toward the rear of the server until the tabs on the fan sink mounting bracket is fully engaged in the holes for fan sink mounting bracket slots on the bottom the chassis.

Note: The tabs are fully engaged when the screw holes in the system board are aligned with the corresponding holes in the chassis.

- 6. Install any of the following components that you removed from the system board:
 - The fan connector covers.
 - · Hypervisor key (see "Installing a USB embedded hypervisor flash device" on page 180).
 - Virtual media key (see "Installing the virtual media key" on page 182).
 - SAS/SATA controller (see "Installing a ServeRAID-BR10il v2 SAS/SATA controller" on page 205).
 - Battery (see "Installing the battery" on page 184).
 - DIMMs (see "Installing a memory module" on page 169).
 - · Microprocessor and fan sink (see "Installing a microprocessor and fan sink" on page 211).
 - · Adapters (see "Installing an adapter" on page 152).
- 7. Press and hold the retaining tab on top of the cage; then, rotate the drive cage into the chassis until it locks into place.
- 8. Reconnect any cables to the system board that you disconnected during removal.
- 9. Install the side cover (see "Installing the side cover" on page 146).
- 10. Lock the side cover if you unlocked it during removal.
- 11. Reconnect the external cables and power cords; then, turn on the attached devices and turn on the server.

Chapter 6. Configuration information and instructions

This chapter provides information about updating the firmware and using the configuration utilities.

Updating the firmware

Important: Some cluster solutions require specific code levels or coordinated code updates. If the device is part of a cluster solution, verify that the latest level of code is supported for the cluster solution before you update the code.

The firmware for the server is periodically updated and is available for download on the IBM Web site. To check for the latest level of firmware, such as the server firmware, vital product data (VPD) code, device drivers, and service processor firmware, complete the following steps.

Note: Changes are made periodically to the IBM Web site. The actual procedure might vary slightly from what is described in this document.

- 1. Go to http://www.ibm.com/systems/support/.
- 2. Under Product support, click System x.
- 3. Under Popular links, click Software and device drivers.
- 4. Click **System x3200 M3** to display the matrix of downloadable files for the server.

Download the latest firmware for the server; then, install the firmware, using the instructions that are included with the downloaded files.

When you replace a device in the server, you might have to either update the server with the latest version of the firmware that is stored in memory on the device or restore the pre-existing firmware from a diskette or CD image.

The following items are downloadable from the Web at http://www.ibm.com/systems/support/:

- Server firmware is stored in ROM on the system board.
- IMM firmware is stored in ROM on the system board.
- Ethernet firmware is stored in ROM on the Ethernet controller.
- ServeRAID firmware is stored in ROM on the ServeRAID adapter.
- SAS/SATA firmware is stored in ROM on the SAS/SATA controller on the system board.

Major components contain VPD code. You can select to update the VPD code during the server firmware update procedure.

Configuring the server

The *ServerGuide* program provides software-setup tools and installation tools that are designed for the server. Use this CD during the installation of the server to configure basic hardware features, such as an integrated SAS/SATA controller with RAID capabilities, and to simplify the installation of your operating system. For information about using this CD, see "Using the ServerGuide Setup and Installation CD" on page 223.

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In addition to the ServerGuide Setup and Installation CD, you can use the following configuration programs to customize the server hardware:

Setup utility

The Setup utility is part of the basic input/output system firmware. Use it to change the startup-device sequence, set the date and time, and set passwords. For information about using this program, see "Using the Setup utility" on page 225.

Boot Manager program

The Boot Manager program is part of the server firmware. Use it to override the startup sequence that is set in the Setup utility and temporarily assign a device to be first in the startup sequence. For more information about using this program, see "Using the Boot Manager program" on page 229.

Integrated Management Module

Use the integrated management module (IMM) for configuration, to update the firmware and sensor data record/field replaceable unit (SDR/FRU) data, and to remotely manage a network. For information about using these programs, see "Using the integrated management module" on page 230.

Remote presence capability and blue-screen capture

The remote presence and blue-screen capture feature are integrated into the Integrated Management Module (IMM). The virtual media key is required to enable the remote presence functions. When the optional virtual media key is installed in the server, it activates the remote presence functions. Without the virtual media key, you will not be able to access the network remotely to mount or unmount drives or images on the client system. However, you will still be able to access the host graphical user interface through the Web interface without the Virtual Media Key. To order the optional IBM Virtual Media Key, contact your IBM marketing representative or authorized reseller. For more information about how to enable the remote presence function, see "Enabling the remote presence feature" on page 231.

Ethernet controller configuration

For information about configuring the Ethernet controller, see "Configuring the Ethernet controller" on page 233.

IBM Advanced Settings Utility (ASU) program

Use this program as an alternative to the Setup utility for modifying UEFI settings. Use the ASU program online or out of band to modify UEFI settings from the command line without the need to restart the server to access the Setup utility. For more information about using this program, see "IBM Advanced Settings Utility program" on page 236.

LSI Configuration Utility program

Use the LSI Configuration Utility program to configure the integrated SAS/SATA controller with RAID capabilities and the devices that are attached to it. For information about using this program, see "Using the LSI Configuration Utility program" on page 234.

Using the ServerGuide Setup and Installation CD

The ServerGuide Setup and Installation CD provides software setup tools and installation tools that are designed for your server. The ServerGuide program detects the server model and hardware options that are installed and uses that information during setup to configure the hardware. The ServerGuide program simplifies operating-system installations by providing updated device drivers and, in some cases, installing them automatically. To download the CD, go to http://www.ibm.com/systems/management/serverguide/sub.html and click IBM Service and Support Site.

The ServerGuide program has the following features:

- An easy-to-use interface
- · Diskette-free setup, and configuration programs that are based on detected hardware
- ServeRAID Manager program, which configures your ServeRAID adapter
- Device drivers that are provided for your server model and detected hardware
- Operating-system partition size and file-system type that are selectable during setup

ServerGuide features

Features and functions can vary slightly with different versions of the ServerGuide program. To learn more about the version that you have, start the ServerGuide Setup and Installation CD and view the online overview. Not all features are supported on all server models.

The ServerGuide program requires a supported IBM server with an enabled startable (bootable) CD drive. In addition to the ServerGuide Setup and Installation CD, you must have your operating-system CD to install the operating system.

The ServerGuide program performs the following tasks:

- · Sets system date and time
- Detects the RAID adapter or controller and runs the SAS/SATA RAID configuration program
- Checks the microcode (firmware) levels of a ServeRAID adapter and determines whether a later level is available from the CD
- Detects installed hardware options and provides updated device drivers for most adapters and devices
- · Provides diskette-free installation for supported Windows operating systems

 Includes an online readme file with links to tips for your hardware and operating-system installation

Setup and configuration overview

When you use the ServerGuide Setup and Installation CD, you do not need setup diskettes. You can use the CD to configure any supported IBM server model. The setup program provides a list of tasks that are required to set up your server model. On a server with a ServeRAID adapter or SAS/SATA controller with RAID capabilities, you can run the SAS/SATA RAID configuration program to create logical drives.

Note: Features and functions can vary slightly with different versions of the ServerGuide program.

When you start the ServerGuide Setup and Installation CD, the program prompts you to complete the following tasks:

- · Select your language.
- · Select your keyboard layout and country.
- · View the overview to learn about ServerGuide features.
- · View the readme file to review installation tips for your operating system and adapter.
- Start the operating-system installation. You will need your operating-system CD.

Important: Before you install a legacy operating system (such as VMware) on a server with an LSI SAS controller, you must first complete the following steps:

- 1. Update the device driver for the LSI SAS controller to the latest level.
- 2. In the Setup utility, set Legacy Only as the first option in the boot sequence in the Boot Manager menu.
- 3. Using the LSI Configuration Utility program, select a boot drive.

Typical operating-system installation

The ServerGuide program can reduce the time it takes to install an operating system. It provides the device drivers that are required for your hardware and for the operating system that you are installing. This section describes a typical ServerGuide operating-system installation.

Note: Features and functions can vary slightly with different versions of the ServerGuide program.

- 1. After you have completed the setup process, the operating-system installation program starts. (You will need your operating-system CD to complete the installation.)
- 2. The ServerGuide program stores information about the server model, service processor, hard disk drive controllers, and network adapters. Then, the program checks the CD for newer device drivers. This information is stored and then passed to the operating-system installation program.
- 3. The ServerGuide program presents operating-system partition options that are based on your operating-system selection and the installed hard disk drives.
- 4. The ServerGuide program prompts you to insert your operating-system CD and restart the server. At this point, the installation program for the operating system takes control to complete the installation.

Installing your operating system without using ServerGuide

If you have already configured the server hardware and you are not using the ServerGuide program to install your operating system, complete the following steps to download the latest operating-system installation instructions from the IBM Web site.

Note: Changes are made periodically to the IBM Web site. The actual procedure might vary slightly from what is described in this document.

- 1. Go to http://www.ibm.com/systems/support/.
- Under Product support, click System x.
- 3. From the menu on the left side of the page, click **System x support search**.
- 4. From the Task menu, select Install.
- 5. From the Product family menu, select System x3200 M3.
- 6. From the **Operating system** menu, select your operating system, and then click Search to display the available installation documents.

Using the Setup utility

Use the Unified Extensible Firmware Interface (UEFI), formerly BIOS, Setup utility to perform the following tasks:

- View configuration information
- View and change assignments for devices and I/O ports
- Set the date and time
- Set the startup characteristics of the server and the order of startup devices
- Set and change settings for advanced hardware features
- · View, set, and change settings for power-management features
- View and clear error logs
- Resolve configuration conflicts

Starting the Setup utility

To start the Setup utility, complete the following steps:

1. Turn on the server.

Note: Approximately 1 to 3 minutes after the server is connected to ac power, the power-control button becomes active.

- 2. When the prompt <F1> Setup is displayed, press F1. If you have set an administrator password, you must type the administrator password to access the full Setup utility menu. If you do not type the administrator password, a limited Setup utility menu is available.
- 3. Select settings to view or change.

Setup utility menu choices

The following choices are on the Setup utility main menu for the UEFI. Depending on the version of the firmware, some menu choices might differ slightly from these descriptions.

System Information

Select this choice to view information about the server. When you make changes through other choices in the Setup utility, some of those changes are reflected in the system information; you cannot change settings directly in the system information. This choice is on the full Setup utility menu only.

System Summary

Select this choice to view configuration information, including the ID, speed, and cache size of the microprocessors, machine type and model of the server, the serial number, the system UUID, and the amount of installed memory. When you make configuration changes through other options in the Setup utility, the changes are reflected in the system summary; you cannot change settings directly in the system summary.

Product Data

Select this choice to view the system-board identifier, the revision level or issue date of the firmware, the integrated management module and diagnostics code, and the version and date.

This choice is on the full Setup utility menu only.

System Settings

Select this choice to view or change the server component settings.

- Processors

Select this choice to view or change the processor settings.

Memory

Select this choice to view or change the memory settings.

Devices and I/O Ports

Select this choice to view or change assignments for devices and input/output (I/O) ports. You can configure the serial ports, configure remote console redirection, enable or disable integrated Ethernet controllers. If you disable a device, it cannot be configured, and the operating system will not be able to detect it (this is equivalent to disconnecting the device).

Power

Select this choice to view or change power capping to control consumption, processors, and performance states.

Legacy Support

Select this choice to view or set legacy support.

- Force Legacy Video on Boot

Select this choice to force INT video support, if the operating system does not support UEFI video output standards.

- Rehook INT 19h

Select this choice to enable or disable devices from taking control of the boot process. The default is **Disable**.

- Legacy Thunk Support

Select this choice to enable or disable UEFI to interact with PCI mass storage devices that are non-UEFI compliant.

Integrated Management Module

Select this choice to view or change the settings for the integrated management module.

POST Watchdog Timer

Select this choice to view or enable the POST watchdog timer.

- POST Watchdog Timer Value

Select this choice to view or set the POST loader watchdog timer value.

- Reboot System on NMI

Enable or disable restarting the system whenever a nonmaskable interrupt (NMI) occurs. Enable is the default.

- Commands on USB Interface Preference

Select this choice to enable or disable the Ethernet over USB interface on IMM.

Network Configuration

Select this choice to view the system management network interface port, the IMM MAC address, the current IMM IP address, and host name; define the static IMM IP address, subnet mask, and gateway address, specify whether to use the static IP address or have DHCP assign the IMM IP address, save the network changes.

Reset IMM to Defaults

Select this choice to view or reset IMM to the default settings.

- Reset IMM

Select this choice to reset IMM.

System Security

Select this choice to view or configure Trusted Platform Module (TPM) support.

Adapters and UEFI Drivers

Select this choice to view information about the UEFI 1.10 and UEFI 2.0 compliant adapters and drivers installed in the server.

Network

Select this choice to view or configure the network device options, such as iSCSI, PXE, and network devices.

Date and Time

Select this choice to set the date and time in the server, in 24-hour format (hour.minute:second).

This choice is on the full Setup utility menu only.

Start Options

Select this choice to view or boot to devices, including the startup sequence, . The server starts from the first boot record that it finds.

This choice is on the full Setup utility menu only.

Boot Manager

Select this choice to view, add, delete, or change the device boot priority, boot from a file, select a one-time boot, or reset the boot order to the default setting. If the server has Wake on LAN hardware and software and the operating system supports Wake on LAN functions, you can specify a startup sequence for the Wake on LAN functions. For example, you can define a startup sequence that checks for a disc in the DVD drive, then checks the hard disk drive, and then checks a network adapter.

System Event Logs

Select this choice to enter the System Event Manager, where you can view the error messages in the system event logs. You can use the arrow keys to move between pages in the error log.

The system event logs contain all event and error messages that have been generated during POST, by the systems-management interface handler, and by the system service processor. Run the diagnostic programs to get more information about error codes that occur. See "Running the diagnostic programs" on page 74 for instructions on running the diagnostic programs.

Important: If the system-error LED on the front of the server is lit but there are no other error indications, clear the IMM system-event log. Also, after you complete a repair or correct an error, clear the IMM system-event log to turn off the system-error LED on the front of the server.

POST Event Viewer

Select this choice to enter the POST event viewer to view the POST error messages.

System Event Log

Select this choice to view the IMM system event log.

Clear System Event Log

Select this choice to clear the IMM system event log.

User Security

Select this choice to set, change, or clear passwords. See "Passwords" for more information.

This choice is on the full and limited Setup utility menu.

Set Power-on Password

Select this choice to set or change a power-on password. See "Power-on password" on page 229 for more information.

- Clear Power-on Password

Select this choice to clear a power-on password. See "Power-on password" on page 229 for more information.

Set Administrator Password

Select this choice to set or change an administrator password. An administrator password is intended to be used by a system administrator; it limits access to the full Setup utility menu. If an administrator password is set, the full Setup utility menu is available only if you type the administrator password at the password prompt. For more information, see "Administrator password" on page 229.

Clear Administrator Password

Select this choice to clear an administrator password. For more information, see "Administrator password" on page 229.

Save Settings

Select this choice to save the changes that you have made in the settings.

Restore Settings

Select this choice to cancel the changes that you have made in the settings and restore the previous settings.

Load Default Settings

Select this choice to cancel the changes that you have made in the settings and restore the factory settings.

Exit Setup

Select this choice to exit from the Setup utility. If you have not saved the changes that you have made in the settings, you are asked whether you want to save the changes or exit without saving them.

Passwords

From the User Security menu choice, you can set, change, and delete a power-on password and an administrator password. The User Security choice is on the full Setup utility menu only.

If you set only a power-on password, you must type the power-on password to complete the system startup and to have access to the full Setup utility menu.

An administrator password is intended to be used by a system administrator; it limits access to the full Setup utility menu. If you set only an administrator

password, you do not have to type a password to complete the system startup, but you must type the administrator password to access the Setup utility menu.

If you set a power-on password for a user and an administrator password for a system administrator, you must type the power-on password to complete the system startup. A system administrator who types the administrator password has access to the full Setup utility menu; the system administrator can give the user authority to set, change, and delete the power-on password. A user who types the power-on password has access to only the limited Setup utility menu; the user can set, change, and delete the power-on password, if the system administrator has given the user that authority.

Power-on password: If a power-on password is set, when you turn on the server, the system startup will not be completed until you type the power-on password. You can use any combination of between six and 20 printable ASCII characters for the password.

If you forget the power-on password, you can regain access to the server in the following way:

• If an administrator password is set, type the administrator password at the password prompt. Start the Setup utility and reset the power-on password.

Administrator password: An administrator password is intended to be used by a system administrator; it limits access to the full Setup utility menu. You can use any combination of between six and 20 printable ASCII characters for the password.

Attention: If you set an administrator password and then forget it, there is no way to change, override, or remove it. You must replace the system board.

Using the Boot Manager program

The Boot Manager program is a built-in, menu-driven configuration utility program that you can use to temporarily redefine the first startup device without changing settings in the Setup utility.

To use the Boot Manager program, complete the following steps:

- 1. Turn off the server.
- 2. Restart the server.
- 3. When the prompt <F12> Select Boot Device is displayed, press F12. If a bootable USB mass storage device is installed, a submenu item (USB Key/Disk) is displayed.
- 4. Use the Up arrow and Down arrow keys to select an item from the **Boot** Selection Menu and press Enter.

The next time the server starts, it returns to the startup sequence that is set in the Setup utility.

Starting the backup server firmware

The system board contains a backup copy area for the server firmware (formerly BIOS firmware). This is a secondary copy of the server firmware that you update only during the process of updating the server firmware. If the primary copy of the server firmware becomes damaged, use this backup copy.

To force the server to start from the backup copy, turn off the server; then, place the J6 jumper in the backup position (pins 2 and 3).

Use the backup copy of the server firmware until the primary copy is restored. After the primary copy is restored, turn off the server; then, move the J6 jumper back to the primary position (pins 1 and 2).

Using the integrated management module

The integrated management module (IMM) is a second generation of the functions that were formerly provided by the baseboard management controller hardware. It combines service processor functions, video controller, and (when an optional virtual media key is installed) remote presence function in a single chip.

The IMM supports the following basic system management features:

- Environmental monitor with fan speed control for temperature, voltages, fan failure, and power supply failure.
- · Light path diagnostics LEDs indicators to report errors that occur with fans, power supplies, microprocessor, hard disk drives, and system errors.
- DIMM error assistance. The Unified Extensible Firmware Interface (UEFI) disables a failing DIMM that is detected during POST, and the IMM lights the associated system error LED and the failing DIMM error LED.
- System event log (SEL).
- ROM-based IMM firmware flash updates.
- Auto Boot Failure Recovery (ABR).
- A virtual media key, which enables remote presence support (remote video, remote keyboard/mouse, and remote storage).
- Automatic microprocessor disable on failure and restart in a two-microprocessor configuration when one microprocessor signals an internal error.
- · Nonmaskable interrupt (NMI) detection and reporting.
- Automatic Server Restart (ASR) when POST is not complete or the operating system hangs and the operating system watchdog timer times-out. The IMM might be configured to watch for the operating system watchdog timer and reboot the system after a timeout, if the ASR feature is enabled. Otherwise, the IMM allows the administrator to generate a nonmaskable interrupt (NMI) by pressing an NMI button on the system board for an operating-system memory dump. ASR is supported by IPMI.
- Intelligent Platform Management Interface (IPMI) Specification V2.0 and Intelligent Platform Management Bus (IPMB) support.
- Serial port redirection over telnet or ssh.
- Serial over LAN (SOL).
- · Active Energy Manager.
- · Query power-supply input power.
- PECI 2 support.
- · Power/reset control (power-on, hard and soft shutdown, hard and soft reset, schedule power control).
- Alerts (in-band and out-of-band alerting, PET traps IPMI style, SNMP, e-mail).
- Operating-system failure blue screen capture.
- · Command-line interface.
- · Configuration save and restore.
- · PCI configuration data.
- Boot sequence manipulation.

The IMM also provides the following remote server management capabilities through the OSA SMBridge management utility program:

Command-line interface (IPMI Shell)

The command-line interface provides direct access to server management functions through the IPMI 2.0 protocol. Use the command-line interface to issue commands to control the server power, view system information, and identify the server. You can also save one or more commands as a text file and run the file as a script.

Serial over LAN

Establish a Serial over LAN (SOL) connection to manage servers from a remote location. You can remotely view and change the UEFI settings, restart the server, identify the server, and perform other management functions. Any standard Telnet client application can access the SOL connection.

Using the remote presence capability and blue-screen capture

The remote presence and blue-screen capture features are integrated functions of the integrated management module (IMM). When the optional IBM Virtual Media Key is installed in the server, it activates the remote presence functions. The virtual media key is required to enable the integrated remote presence and blue-screen capture features. Without the virtual media key, you will not be able to access the network remotely to mount or unmount drives or images on the client system. However, you can still access the Web interface without the key.

After the virtual media key is installed in the server, it is authenticated to determine whether it is valid. If the key is not valid, you receive a message from the Web interface (when you attempt to start the remote presence feature) indicating that the hardware key is required to use the remote presence feature.

The virtual media key has an LED. When this LED is lit and green, it indicates that the key is installed and functioning correctly. When the LED is not lit, it indicates that the key might not be installed correctly.

The remote presence feature provides the following functions:

- Remotely viewing video with graphics resolutions up to 1600 x 1200 at 85 Hz. regardless of the system state
- · Remotely accessing the server, using the keyboard and mouse from a remote
- Mapping the DVD drive, diskette drive, and USB flash drive on a remote client, and mapping ISO and diskette image files as virtual drives that are available for use by the server
- Uploading a diskette image to the IMM memory and mapping it to the server as a virtual drive

The blue-screen capture feature captures the video display contents before the IMM restarts the server when the IMM detects an operating-system hang condition. A system administrator can use the blue-screen capture to assist in determining the cause of the hang condition.

Enabling the remote presence feature

To enable the remote presence feature, complete the following steps:

- 1. Install the virtual media key into the dedicated slot on the system board (see "System-board optional-devices connectors" on page 18).
- 2. Turn on the server.

Note: Approximately 1 to 3 minutes after the server is connected to ac power, the power-control button becomes active.

Obtaining the IP address for the IMM

To access the Web interface, you need the IP address for IMM. You can obtain the IMM IP address through the Setup utility. The server comes with a default IP address for the IMM of 192.168.70.125. To locate the IP address, complete the following steps:

1. Turn on the server.

Note: Approximately 1 to 3 minutes after the server is connected to ac power, the power-control button becomes active.

- 2. When the prompt <F1> Setup is displayed, press F1. (This prompt is displayed on the screen for only a few seconds. You must press F1 quickly.) If you have set both a power-on password and an administrator password, you must type the administrator password to access the full Setup utility menu.
- 3. From the Setup utility main menu, select System Settings.
- 4. On the next screen, select Integrated Management Module.
- 5. On the next screen, select **Network Configuration**.
- 6. Find the IP address and write it down.
- 7. Exit from the Setup utility.

Logging on to the Web interface

To log onto the Web interface to use the remote presence functions, complete the following steps:

1. Open a Web browser on a computer that connects to the server and in the address or URL field, type the IP address or host name of the IMM to which vou want to connect.

Note: The IMM defaults to DHCP. If a DHCP host is not available, the IMM assigns a static IP address of 192.168.70.125.

2. On the Login page, type the user name and password. If you are using the IMM for the first time, you can obtain the user name and password from your system administrator. All login attempts are documented in the event log.

Note: The IMM is set initially with a user name of USERID and password of PASSW0RD (passw0rd with a zero, not a the letter O). You have read/write access. You must change the default password the first time you log on.

- 3. On the Welcome page, type a timeout value (in minutes) in the field that is provided. The IMM will log you off of the Web interface if your browser is inactive for the number of minutes that you entered for the timeout value.
- 4. Click **Continue** to start the session. The System Health page provides a guick view of the system status.

Enabling the Intel Gigabit Ethernet Utility program

The Intel Gigabit Ethernet Utility program is part of the server firmware. You can use it to configure the network as a startable device, and you can customize where the network startup option appears in the startup sequence.

To enable the Intel Gigabit Ethernet Utility program, complete the following steps:

1. From the Setup utility main menu, select **Devices and I/O Ports** and press Enter.

- Select Enable/Disable onboard device(s) and press Enter.
- 3. Select Ethernet and press Enter.
- 4. Select **Enable** and press Enter.
- 5. Exit to the main menu and select **Save Settings** and press Enter.

Configuring the Ethernet controller

The Ethernet controller is integrated on the system board. It provides an interface for connecting to a 10-Mbps, 100-Mbps, or 1-Gbps network and provides full-duplex (FDX) capability, which enables simultaneous transmission and reception of data on the network. If the Ethernet ports in the server support auto-negotiation, the controller detects the data-transfer rate (10BASE-T, 100BASE-TX, or 1000BASE-T) and duplex mode (full-duplex or half-duplex) of the network and automatically operates at that rate and mode.

You do not have to set any jumpers or configure the controller. However, you must install a device driver to enable the operating system to address the controller. To find updated information about configuring the controller, complete the following steps.

Note: Changes are made periodically to the IBM Web site. The actual procedure might vary slightly from what is described in this document.

- 1. Go to http://www.ibm.com/systems/support/.
- 2. Under Product support, click System x.
- 3. Under Popular links, click Software and device drivers.
- 4. From the Product family menu, select System x3200 M3 and click Go.

Enabling and configuring Serial over LAN (SOL)

Establish a Serial over LAN (SOL) connection to manage servers from a remote location. You can remotely view and change the BIOS settings, restart the server, identify the server, and perform other management functions. Any standard Telnet client application can access the SOL connection.

To enable and configure the server for SOL, you must update and configure the UEFI code; update and configure the integrated management module (IMM) firmware; update and configure the Ethernet controller firmware; and enable the operating system for an SOL connection.

UEFI update and configuration

To update and configure the UEFI code to enable SOL, complete the following steps:

- 1. Update the UEFI code:
 - a. Download the latest version of the UEFI code from http://www.ibm.com/ systems/support/.
 - b. Update the UEFI code, following the instructions that come with the update file that you downloaded.
- 2. Update the IMM firmware:
 - a. Download the latest version of the IMM firmware from http://www.ibm.com/ systems/support/.
 - b. Update the IMM firmware, following the instructions that come with the update file that you downloaded.
- 3. Configure the UEFI settings:

- a. When you are prompted to start the Configuration/Setup Utility program, restart the server and press F1.
- b. Select System Settings → Devices and I/O Ports.
- c. Select Console Redirection Settings; then, make sure that the values are set as follows:

· COM Port 1: Enable

· Remote Console: Enable Serial Port Sharing: Enable

Serial Port Access Mode: Dedicated COM1 Settings

• Baud Rate: 115200

• Data Bits: 8 Parity: None Stop

• Bits: 1

 Thermal Emulation: ANSI Active After Boot: Enable · Flow Control: Hardware

- d. Press Esc twice to exit the Devices and I/O Ports section of the Configuration/Setup Utility program.
- e. Select Save Settings; then, press Enter.
- f. Press Enter to confirm.
- g. Select **Exit Setup**; then, press Enter.
- h. Make sure that Yes, exit the Setup Utility is selected; then, press Enter.

Using the LSI Configuration Utility program

Note: There are no RAID support on simple-swap models of the server.

Use the LSI Configuration Utility program to configure and manage redundant array of independent disks (RAID) arrays on hot-swap models of the server. Be sure to use this program as described in this document.

- Use the LSI Configuration Utility program to perform the following tasks:
 - Perform a low-level format on a hard disk drive
 - Create an array of hard disk drives with or without a hot-spare drive
 - Set protocol parameters on hard disk drives

The integrated SAS/SATA controller with RAID capabilities supports RAID arrays. The hot-swap server models come with the ServerRAID-BR10il adapter installed. which provides RAID levels 0, 1, and 1E support. You can use the LSI Configuration Utility program to configure RAID 1 (IM), RAID 1E (IME), and RAID 0 (IS) for a single pair of attached devices. If you install the optional ServeRAID-MR10i SAS/SATA controller or the optional ServeRAID-MR10is VAULT SAS/SATA controller with an encryption 1078 DE chip, they provide RAID levels 0, 1, 5, 6, and 10 support. If you install a different type of RAID adapter, follow the instructions in the documentation that comes with the adapter to view or change settings for attached devices.

In addition, you can download an LSI command-line configuration program from http://www.ibm.com/systems/support/.

When you are using the LSI Configuration Utility program to configure and manage arrays on hot-swap models of the server, consider the following information:

- The integrated SAS/SATA controller with RAID capabilities supports the following features:
 - Integrated Mirroring (IM) with hot-spare support (also known as RAID 1) Use this option to create an integrated array of two disks plus up to two optional hot spares. All data on the primary disk can be migrated.
 - Integrated Mirroring Enhanced (IME) with hot-spare support (also known as RAID 1E)
 - Use this option to create an integrated mirror enhanced array of three to eight disks, including up to two optional hot spares. All data on the array disks will be deleted.
 - Integrated Striping (IS) (also known as RAID 0) Use this option to create an integrated striping array of two to eight disks. All data on the array disks will be deleted.
- Hard disk drive capacities affect how you create arrays. The drives in an array can have different capacities, but the RAID controller treats them as if they all have the capacity of the smallest hard disk drive.
- If you use an integrated SAS/SATA controller with RAID capabilities to configure a RAID 1 (mirrored) array after you have installed the operating system, you will lose access to any data or applications that were previously stored on the secondary drive of the mirrored pair.
- If you install a different type of RAID controller, see the documentation that comes with the controller for information about viewing and changing settings for attached devices.

Starting the LSI Configuration Utility program

To start the LSI Configuration Utility program, complete the following steps:

1. Turn on the server.

Note: Approximately 1 to 3 minutes after the server is connected to ac power, the power-control button becomes active.

- 2. When the prompt <F1 Setup> is displayed, press F1. If you have set an administrator password, you are prompted to type the password.
- 3. Select System Settings → Adapters and UEFI drivers.
- 4. Select Please refresh this page on the first visit and press Enter.
- 5. Select LSI controller driver name Driver and press Enter, where controller_driver_name is the name of the SAS/SATA controller driver. For the SAS/SATA controller driver name, see the documentation that comes with your controller.
- 6. To perform storage-management tasks, follow the procedures in the documentation that comes with the SAS/SATA controller.

When you have finished changing settings, press Esc to exit from the program; select Save to save the settings that you have changed.

Formatting a hard disk drive

Low-level formatting removes all data from the hard disk. If there is data on the disk that you want to save, back up the hard disk before you perform this procedure.

Note: Before you format a hard disk, make sure that the disk is not part of a mirrored pair.

To format a drive, complete the following steps:

- 1. From the list of adapters, select the controller (channel) for the drive that you want to format and press Enter.
- 2. Select SAS Topology and press Enter.
- 3. Select Direct Attach Devices and press Enter.
- 4. To highlight the drive that you want to format, use the Up Arrow and Down Arrow keys. To scroll left and right, use the Left Arrow and Right Arrow keys or the End key. Press Alt+D.

Creating a RAID array of hard disk drives
